- ► San Jose Mayor Chuck Reed To start the New Year, we are very pleased to have San Jose's new Mayor, Chuck Reed be keynote speaker at our January VEP General Meeting. He will present a brief talk on his goals for San Jose in 2007 and then will answer questions from our audience.
- ▶ Laura Wells, San Jose DOT Division Manager, will do a follow-up presentation on possible design options for traffic calming and improved safety on Chynoweth Avenue, between Pearl and Gaundabert-New World. The VEP executive board will seek your funding approval for VEP's 2007 Community Service Awards at our January 30th general meeting. These awards are grants towards higher education or vocational training for graduating high school seniors who have demonstrated exceptional records of volunteerism and community service during their high school careers. This is VEP's 21st year of offering these awards.

Board is recommending up to three \$1,000 awards; **Community** one each for graduating students at 0 For your consideration and vote, our Executive one each for graduating students at Gunderson and Andrew Hill, and one for a graduating At-Large student. This is a reduction from last year's allocation.

Service Awards

Our At-Large category is defined as a graduating high school senior who resides in San Jose and is nominated by a current VEP member.

If you know a high school senior with an outstanding volunteer record, make sure he or she knows about our award. We encourage Gunderson and Andrew Hill students to contact their administrators to request that they be one of the three students that each school will nominate.

Our 2007 Community Service Award application forms will be available on our website in late February, and the At-Large form will be published in the February VEP News. All applications will be due on or before April 24, 2007.

The San Jose City Council has scheduled a tribute to retired Police Captain **Jack Farmer** at their 1:30 p.m. meeting at city hall (200 E. Santa Clara Street) on Tuesday, January 23rd. VEP members are urged to attend, as "Captain Jack" has been a good, long-time friend of our organization.



Captain Jack retired January 10 after a 30-year career, spending four years as commander of SJPD's southern division which serves more than 350,000 San Joseans. Captain Jack and his sergeants often attended VEP and other community association meetings, getting to know us and hearing our concerns first-hand—that's how many of our members got to know

him. We often called on him for help and were never disappointed. He was broadly regarded as a role model for our city's community policing program.

Stadium lights at Gunderson?

San Jose Unified School District (SJUSD) is now proposing to install lights for nighttime games and events at the Gunder-



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son High School stadium. If approved, the lights will be ready for use when school opens in August 2007.

Gunderson is one of six SJUSD high schools being considered—San Jose High already has stadium lights. The community surrounding each school is being asked for input by way of public meetings. A total of three will be held at Gunderson. The first two were held on December 14 and January 10. The final meeting at Gunderson will be in the Media Center at 6 pm on February 5.

What's being proposed is said to have minimal off-site illumination impacts because new technology lighting is mounted

higher (on 80-foot high posts) and directed more vertically downward. The lights at San Jose High are of this type, and the District will schedule a nighttime demonstration for those interested in seeing them first-hand. That demonstration is targeted for mid-February (check SJUSD's website for date and time).



District officials say that night games and events will be limited to ten per year at each school site. However, use of stadium lighting is also being proposed for an unknown number of non-competitive after-school practice sessions. Lighting will be used for school activity only (not for leased or non-school use) and be announced in advance.

Issues being reviewed in the District's initial environmental study include: traffic congestion, noise, litter, parking, photo metrics, and the number and hours of events each year. That work will be done in full compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). As part of the approval process, the District will be required to publicly disclose and mitigate any identified significant adverse impacts.

The February 5 meeting will feature the results of this Initial Study which will be used to determine how the SJUSD Board proceeds through the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) process. If there appear to be major impacts, a full EIR would be needed (a very costly undertaking). If the Initial Study concludes that there are no or less serious impacts, the District could issue a Negative Declaration.

After these community meetings, the Board of Trustees will hold a public hearing to decide whether and/or which schools will get lights. That meeting will likely occur in March. (As soon as we can, VEP will announce the meeting schedule to our members.)

Although we're told that the District has funding for this project, to-date its source has not been disclosed. SJUSD's Superintendent, Don Iglesias assured the Gunderson community that Bond Measure F money will not be used.

VEP recommends that folks who live near Gunderson be sure to attend SJUSD's meetings to gain an in-depth understanding of what's proposed and to make their concerns and feelings of support or opposition known.



This past month, the library building and parking lot area were demolished. The contractor is proceeding with final removal



of site underground lines, doing the rough grading, surveying, and establishing the new building's final grade. When that's completed, the new utility lines will be installed, and compaction of the building pad will start. This is expected to be completed by mid-February.



What is Neighborhood Watch?

Neighborhood Watch focuses on informing the community how to discourage, deter, and prevent crimes such as burglary, auto theft, car break-ins, and personal crimes which of-

ten occur in or near homes. Issues such as vandalism, graffiti, drug dealing, and gang activity are also addressed when applicable.



communities together with the police to achieve the common goal of preventing crime.

How can a meeting be arranged?

To request a Neighborhood Watch meeting, call Crime Prevention at (408) 277-4133. The Crime Prevention Specialist who represents the area in San Jose in which you live will work with you to schedule the meeting date (usually at least three to four weeks notice is required). Invitation notices will be sent to you to distribute to your neighbors.

Neighborhood Watch meetings are held on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday evenings at 7 p.m. They last approximately two hours. At least ten homes must be represented in order for a meeting to take place. Most meetings are held in your home or at a neighborhood facility.

What happens at the meeting?

Neighborhood Watch provides an opportunity to meet representatives of your police depart-ment face-to-face to discuss and work to solve problems in your community, or to keep the problems from starting in the first place.

Through this positive, pro-active program, you will learn facts about:

- Police districts and beats
- · Duties of beat officers
- Crime trends in your area
- How to react to suspicious or criminal activity
- How San Jose's 9-1-1 system works
- Recommended security measures
- Types of locks
- Lighting
- Alarms

- Operation Identification--and much more.

Only residents attending the meeting will be entitled to a Neighborhood Watch window sign and other materials distributed at the meeting.

If 70% of the homes on your block are represented at the meeting, metal Neighborhood Watch signs will be installed on the streetlight poles on your block.

Could this happen to you?

Upon leaving his home one morning, a San Jose man observed a young man sitting in a car across the street. Although he felt suspicious about the stranger, he went on to work. When he returned home that evening,

he found his home ransacked and burglarized.

A San Jose woman went to the grocery store one afternoon. She left her sliding patio door slightly open. "I was only gone fifteen minutes", she stated, after returning home to find more than \$2,000 worth of her property missing.

One morning, a young man convinced a 79 year-old woman to allow him into her home to allegedly give her a written estimate on yard work. Once in the house, the man raped the woman.

Several neighbors on a San Jose street noticed that new residents of a nearby home had many, frequent "guests" visiting for short periods of time. There had also been recent auto and home burglaries in the area. Although they suspected drug dealing, they were not sure what to do because they could not prove anything.

These are just a few examples of real-life situations in San Jose which result in the establishment of Neighborhood Watch programs. Don't wait to become a victim--get involved now!

Do you know...

- Most residential burglaries occur during daylight hours?
- Burglars can tell at a glance which homes are easy targets?
- What to do if you see a suspicious person on your street?
- What types of personal attacks can happen to you right in your neighborhood?
- Why personal property which has been engraved with a California driver's license number is less likely to be stolen?
- That crime rates in Neighborhood Watch communities can be greatly reduced through the simple, common



sense measures you can learn by attending a Neighborhood Watch meeting?

The San Jose Police Department is eager to work with you to "Take a Bite Out Of Crime." Doing this begins with a meeting and ends with a safer neighborhood.

Gunderson High School happenings

For those of you who travel along Gaundabert Lane, you have noticed the steady
progress of our new 15 classroom building.
It is almost complete. Teachers are slated
to move in over the Winter Break in February. We are all very excited about this improvement to our school.

In conjunction with the San Jose Unified School District, Gunderson has been exploring the possibility of having lights installed in our football stadium. To this end, we have hosted two community meetings (one in December and one in January) to hear from parents, students, faculty, staff and community members their thoughts on this project. Many people expressed the positive benefits stadium lights would bring to the school (i.e. increased school pride and spirit, more field availability for weekend use by the community, less impact to students with regard to academics and studying, etc.)

In addition, like other schools in our district, concerns with traffic, noise, and the number of evening events have been expressed. Both our school and the district have plans in place to mitigate these issues. There will be one final community meeting on Monday, February 5 at 6 p.m. in the Gunder-

son Media Center. We invite you to join us.

Finally, a pleasant reminder to our neighbors... The Gunderson property does not include a dog park. Many of our athletes and coaches (especially those who play soccer) have noticed an increased amount of animal waste on the fields. Dogs, leashed or unleashed, are <u>not</u> allowed on the facility. If you decide to bring your dog on campus despite this rule, please be courteous enough to clean up after Fido. The students appreciate it!

San Jose District 10 news

-Councilwoman Nancy Pyle I wish each of you a happy New Year! I am confident that 2007 will be a great year for the residents of District 10.

While serving as co-chair of the *Coyote Valley Task Force* in 2006, I worked hard to protect District 10 from possible negative impacts caused by possible Coyote development. For example, in December a project came to council which would have led to development in the South Almaden Urban Reserve (SAVUR).

I authored a memo which recommended denial of that development proposal, and also asked our planning department to conduct a growth assessment of the SAVUR. My goal is to have this information available for use by the council in determining whether new restraints are needed to more effectively protect environmental resources, open space, and our residents' quality of life.

I am pleased to be working with Mayor **Chuck Reed** to ensure that we maintain the priorities and precedents important to District 10 residents. His commitment to the needs and desires of this city and its residents are obvious and I look forward to a strong working relationship

Mayor Reed appointed me to chair the council's Community & Economic Development Committee. This committee's job is to manage the growth and change of our city in order to encourage a strong economy while maintaining healthy neighborhoods.

Approximately 45 individuals attended the city's annual meeting with sports field users last month. Topics discussed included Measure P Bond funds, recap of sports field-related capital improvements, and an overview of the upcoming sports field feasibility study. The city also announced its intention to establish a community advisory task force as part of that study; about ten of the participants expressed interest in serving on the task force.

Staff will be making similar presentations to other stakeholder groups during the next two months and will report to the Parks & Recreation Commission and the appropriate Council Committee as this study proceeds.

~ San Jose Awarded Enterprise Zone ~

The state recently confirmed San Jose's designation as an Enterprise Zone. Our previous designation was scheduled to expire at the end of last year. An Enterprise Zone designation will be key in retaining the businesses the city has in place, expanding those into larger players in the market, and accelerating investment into new industries, such as biotech, nanotech, and green technologies energy.

~ Wildlife Center of Silicon Valley ~

The Wildlife Center of Silicon Valley has provided services to



our city since 2002. The only rehabilitation and release facility providing these services in our valley, they continue to operate with only 3.5 staff members, using mainly volunteer services. Their funding comes primarily from individual donations, fundraising events, and city contracts.

Gardening tips

~ Dumping leaves in your garden ~

Those leaves that you pile into your garden hoping for lazy man's composting to occur won't cut it. A lot of nitrogen is lost when raw organic matter lays on top of soil or is tilled into it.

Bacteria that do decomposing use up lots of nitrogen when they work, leaving little for plants. That is why leaves should be composted BEFORE they are added to the soil.

Though the addition of organic matter is commendable, you have to supplement the soil with nitrogen when using undecomposed matter such as leaves.

Use sulfate of ammonia every other month at the rate of five pounds per thousand square feet and water it in immediately afterward. This high-nitrogen fertilizer will help your vegetables thrive by offsetting the loss of nitrogen used up by the bacteria. You'll like the price, too (\$3 per 20-lb bag) and the ease of application. It's available at OSH and nurseries.

~ Turning over weeds ~

Some people think the easiest way to assassinate a bed of weeds is to turn the soil over. You're just sowing weed seeds for the future. When tilling the soil, you will turn up weed seeds that have been dormant in the soil since your grandmother did the same thing. They sprout when exposed to light and moisture.

Pre-emergent herbicides are the real answer. When applied to the soil surface after removing all the weeds, the chemicals provide a layer that kills the emerging sprouts of nearly all weeds. Pre-emergents are easy to spread but, to ensure complete control, must be done before summer or winter weeds sprout.

Products called *Preen*, *Amaze*, and *Preclude* are sold locally. Applying twice yearly, February and August-September means no more tilling and no more weeds!

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~ Coffee grounds good for plants? ~

As I have stated before, composting your used coffee grounds, or adding them around plants directly is helpful to plants. You can also get a 10-pound bag of grounds from Starbucks and put them around plants like pumpkins, tomatoes, and peppers this spring.

Coffee grounds are slightly acidic, which helps lower the soil's pH, making it easier for plants to grow and get nutrients from it. This should be done in moderation, however, because it takes a long time for coffee grounds to deteriorate. Mix them with other organic materials and use as a mulch.

~ Watering toe ~

To make a great water bubbler for watering your vegetable or flower garden, place one old sock inside another old sock, and then place a piece of brick in the toe. Now wire the socks to the end of a garden hose, and use it in your garden.

~ More watering ~

Bury cans, with both ends removed, between your veggies; fill the cans with little rocks. Water directly into the cans, and the water will run through to the roots.

~ Quick garden mulch ~

Yesterday's news makes an excellent garden mulch. Put down up to three alternating layers of single newspaper sheets and then lay three inches of grass clippings over the top. This is a great project for the winter.

~ House Plant Mulch ~

a layer of granulated charcoal on top of potting soil in your house plants filters out any unwanted additives in the water.

~ Homemade hothouse ~

To keep your house plants happy and healthy while you're away on vacation, keep them in a hothouse made by loosely draping a plastic dry cleaning bag over a coat hanger frame. This will retain soil moisture for up to two weeks.

~ To-do list ~

[Taken from the January 6, 2007 San Jose Mercury News.] Prune roses, fruit trees, berries and grapes. Apply dormant

spray to deciduous trees and shrubs if aphids, scale, or whiteflies have been a problem in previous seasons. Apply tri-basic copper sulfate or lime sulfur for peach leaf curl now into mid-February. Sign up to be a Master Com poster volunteer. Classes run through March 14. Visit www.reducewaste.org or call (408) 918-4640. The "Joy of Gardening: Back to Basics and Be-

po Not TOP TREEs

DO <u>NOT</u> TOP TREES: Topping trees is very harmful to proper tree growth and appearance. When a tree is topped, it is shocked into producing fast growth to the sides of the topped branches. The new growth will look very unnatural as it matures over time, and will also be weaker than normal growth. For full details, see your April 2006 VEP News (available at www.vepca.org).

Home maintenance

~ January ~

TOP JOB: Clean rain gutters. Leaves and other de-bris will hamper drainage and might promote rust-ing and roof dam-



age. Make sure that water flow-ing from downspouts is draining away from the foundation. Compost the leaves.

ALSO: Inspect crawl space after rain for accumu-lation of water, as well as for indications of water damage on the subfloor and joists beneath bath-rooms, kitchen, and laundry. Look for signs of

pest or dry-rot damage. Do not block perimeter wall vents to a crawl space in winter.

~ February ~

TOP JOB: Using binoculars, inspect roof from the ground (walking on a damp or wet roof can be dangerous). Look for loose, missing, or damaged roofing materials. Repair any damage. If you have access to the underside of the roof, check during a heavy rain for leaks.

ALSO: Clean condenser coils or fins beneath or be-hind the refrigerator according to the manufactur-er's instructions. Make certain air flow around the appliance is adequate.

Trim branches around your roof line to keep squir-rels and other pesky animals off the roof. Inspect all vents, repair as needed and remove any debris blocking airflow.

~ Each month ~

- ✓Test and inspect smoke, heat, and gas detectors.
- ✓ Check fire extinguishers. Replace or service as needed.
- ✓ Check to be certain nothing flammable is near a source of flame, such as a water heater pilot light, gas range, furnace, etc.
- ✓Practice your family fire-escape plan and review earthquake preparedness. Inspect electrical cords for damage. Repair or replace if needed.
- ✓ Check the operation of all electrical circuit breakers by turning each off and on. Do the same with ground fault circuit interrupters, usually found in bathroom, kitchen, garage, and outdoor outlets. Replace those not working properly.
- ✓Always be alert for other safety hazards, such as cracked walkways, hazardous materials that aren't properly stored, or unsecured heavy bookcases or other furniture that could topple during an earthquake.
- ✓ Check water softener. Add salt if needed.
- ✓Clean garbage disposal by grinding up two trays of ice cubes made from a mixture of 1 cup white vinegar in 1 gallon of water. (Be certain to use the disposer cap when grinding.) For a pleasant smell, follow the cleaning by grinding a lemon.

New Year's resolutions?

Happy New Year! Most people start the New Year with one or more resolutions: To loose weight, get more exercise, reduce the amount of stress in your life, reduce the amount of clutter.

How about getting more sleep and rest? Are you getting enough sleep? The answer, researchers tell us, is a resounding <u>no</u>. Most Americans today only get 5- to 6-hours per night. A mounting pile of research says that all of us need a minimum of 8 hours--more is better.

So why aren't we getting enough sleep? We all lead very

busy lives, with many demands on our time. With all of our electronic devices, we increasingly "multitask" to the point of



taking voicemails and e-mails even in bed! If you aren't getting enough sleep, or are unable to get a good night's sleep, Wellness Coach and Author of "Stress and Sleep", Michael Braus says the following suggestions may help.

~ Sleep ~

Set a goal to have 8 hours of sleep each night, every night (weekdays and weekends). Go to bed and get up at the same time every day. Enough sleep gives you more energy, helps you to have a positive attitude, which helps you to accomplish more.

Sleep in a cool environment - 65 to 70 degrees is best.

~ Before going to bed ~

Avoid eating three hours before sleep. Avoid alcohol, tobacco and caffeine--these can increase anxiety. Hide or cover illuminated clocks (prevents clock watching while trying to go to sleep).

~ Allergies and sensitivities ~

Get in tune with how your body responds to caffeine and make adjustments. Some people can drink three cups just before bed, others will stay awake with one cup, three hours before bed. Look at your pillows, sheets, detergents, pets in bed, dust, mold, perfumes, air fresheners--all of these can and may prevent a good night's sleep.

~ Bedding ~

If your pillow is flat, stained, or has an odor, it is time to replace it. Rotate your mattress at least once per year. If it is more than seven years old, you probably need a new one.

~ Once in bed ~

If you have trouble falling asleep, use a white noise machine or CD that is soothing. Ceiling or stand-alone fans can provide a constant hum that can be sleep friendly. Sleep in a dark room with no lights. Cover your windows from all outside light; use heavy drapes if necessary. These also act as sound barriers.

~ Relax before going to bed ~

Stress not only makes you miserable, it wrecks havoc on sleep. Develop a pre-sleep ritual; for instance, try reading that is amusing or of special interest to you. Light stretching or a hot bath also helps break the connection between the day's stress and bedtime.

~ What not to do ~

Do not have high wattage lights in the bedroom (turn down



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the lights 30 minutes prior to bedtime). Do not use your bedroom as a substitute office--no electronics, desktop computers, laptops, cell phones, palms or blackberries--especially not on the bed!

~ Naps ~

20-minute to 2-hour naps during the day can also help (if you are able to nap). Naps lasting more than three hours, however, will cause problems sleeping through the night.

Neighborhood scuttlebutt

Branham Lane widening project: The city is still working with the county on a right-of-way transfer agreement. Not at odds over large issues, the ongoing delay is mostly due to working through options in dealing with some restrictions on the fund-

ing that the city is committing towards Martial Cottle Park. In the meantime, San Jose's Department of Transportation design team is ready to begin preliminary engineering work, so they're asking the county to clear the way by doing the necessary surveying.



If you are interested in joining VEP's Branham Widening Committee, call me at 578-6428. Meetings with city staff will resume soon after the land transfer deal is formally approved.

Median island landscaping on Vistapark Drive: VEP has been working for more than a year to get the landscaping completed on Vistapark Drive, just north of Capitol Expressway. Trees were planted there, but the cobblestone treatment used on adjacent median islands to the north was never completed on this short segment. We suspect someone forgot to require whoever planted the trees to finish this job.

San Jose's Department of Public Works worked out two cost estimates for adding additional decorative materials to the

median island. The first option to install cobblestones would cost approximately \$25,500 (\$13 per square foot). The second option to install decorative gravel would cost approximately \$9,100 (labor and material).

We're told that there is no funding source available at this time to construct either of these two options. Until a funding source is identified, the job cannot be finished.

<u>Chynoweth Avenue traffic calming</u>: City of San Jose's DOT collected traffic data in October that indicates the speed display signs have been effective in reducing speeds along Chynoweth during hours when students are traveling to and from school, as well as throughout the day.

Average speeds were reduced about 1- to 4-mph. The greatest reduction occurred in the eastbound direction on the segment west of Route 87, where average speeds dropped to

38mph overall and to 34mph during school hours. (The speed limit there is still 35mph during school hours.)

In addition, the percentage of motorists traveling at 10mph or more above the posted speed limit dropped substantially

along this stretch. Traffic data did show a few cars traveling in excess of 60mph, as was the case before the signs went in. Before they were installed, 10% of motorists there were traveling at 45 mph and above. With the signs, the percentage is now down to about 3.5%.

In front of Gunderson High School, motorists were traveling slower throughout the day before the signs were installed, so their impact is less pronounced. However, after installation, there was an overall reduction of 1 mph in average east-bound speeds, dropping to under 33mph overall and to 30mph during school hours.

Speed display signs are not used 24/7 anywhere else in San Jose. Hopefully motorists will continue to pay attention to them on Chynoweth. Although there's no way to guarantee against crashes on Chynoweth, reduced speeds will hopefully lessen their severity.

Per VEP's request last autumn, the city has prepared drawings that show the layout of a potential restriping of Chynoweth to a two-lane roadway with a bike lane.

Given the positive results of the radar signs, city traffic engineers now feel that making additional changes at this time may not be necessary. They're saying that a reduction to two-lanes may not contribute to an appreciable improvement in traffic conditions on Chynoweth Avenue.

High-density development at Capitol-Narvaez

VTA's effort to select a developer for its 8.9-acre Capitol-Narvaez park-n-ride lot was temporarily derailed on December 14. On a split vote, the VTA Board of Directors approved County Supervisor **Don Gage**'s motion to reject bids, refine the bid selection criterion, then and go back out for a second round of bidding. No schedule was set for this process.

High-density housing and retail uses are envisioned for the entire park-n-ride lot south of Capitol Expressway and the adjacent 2-acre county-owned parcel immediately south of it. Housing units will likely be a mix of multi-storied rental apart-



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ments and owner-occupied condominiums. Retail stores would provide convenience shopping for residents and transit users.

All that will remain for those who drive to this transit station is the small parking lot on the north side of Capitol.

VEP voiced its concerns about the impacts on traffic congestion and safety at that site. In particular, the ramp meter on the northbound Route 87 approach on Narvaez is a traffic nightmare every workday morning, often causing dangerous back-ups onto Capitol Expressway. Extensive nearby development in recent years has made that situation worse. At this time, there is no plan for traffic improvements.

On the plus side, this proposed project has allowed us to draw the attention of our city and county representatives to the need for a solution to this problem. Importantly, by delaying the selection of a developer, VTA has unwittingly bought us some time to lobby for action.



VTA has already commissioned a traffic study whose results we're eagerly awaiting. Councilwoman **Nancy Pyle** is working on having the city reevaluate its erroneous level-of-service rating at the Narvaez approach to Route 87, a vital first-step.

VEP has also lobbied to have a neighborhood park built on Narvaez at Bridget Drive for many years. The nearest park is too far for most kids to walk. We'd like to have VTA and the city add that park as a condition of approval on any new development on the park-n-ride lot.

Most importantly, though, VEP wants a plan and secure funding for a solution to the northbound Route 87 freeway approach problem on Narvaez Avenue.

VEP electronic communications

Our committee met on December 3rd and embarked on several new initiatives:



We will advance a formal proposal to VEP members to elevate the VEP webmaster position an elected, voting position on the VEP executive board titled *Electronic Communications Director*. **Adina Pierce** volunteered to serve as our first ECD. Just as with our newsletter editor, it's im-

portant that our ECD attends VEP's monthly executive board meetings, which Adina has already begun to do. VEP thanks **Mark Schoenberg** for serving as our most recent webmaster and setting up our current website. Mark will continue to support Adina.

The committee voted to request that the executive board approve a \$200 annual budget for the committee. (Our exec board later approved this budget at its January 8th meeting.)

The committee voted to transition to a new more powerful web hosting service.

Adina proposed and has since implemented a new moreautomated method of sending emails to our members. We call those emails "president's messages", though you may have heard us use the nickname "disty".

After we transition to our new web hosting service, we plan to launch a new easier-to-join e-list that will allow members to communicate with each other in virtual group discussions via email. Subjects could range from contractor recommendations, to lost dog notices, to neighborhood security issues, and much more. Don't worry; this will be an opt-in service, so you won't receive the extra email traffic unless you want it.

The committee will consider implementing forums on our website. You may have seen these discussion boards on other websites.

Over half of VEP's members have provided us their email addresses. Have you? (If not, please do.) Having your email address allows us to provide reminders of upcoming meetings and notices for any important community events that may arise between newsletter publication deadlines. Potholes have you in a rut?

A recent survey disclosed the fact that San Jose streets and roads are in the worst condition of all U.S. cities studied. That came as no surprise to VEP members. Our streets have crumbled noticeably in recent years and it seems like nothing is being done to correct it.

If anything, the schedule for periodic maintenance is being stretched on the city's 2,260 miles of streets, adding more years between cost-effective surface repairs that prolong pavement life. The result will be disastrous; deferred maintenance will mean that many streets and roads will fail prematurely, then need to be torn up and reconstructed. Reconstruction is very expensive and money seems always to be in

short supply.

The costs of delaying maintenance are borne by taxpayers in more ways than one. Beyond street repair and reconstruction, we also pay on an ongoing basis to repair our cars. Shock

absorbers, tires and wheels, front-end alignments, and other auto suspension repairs caused by bad pavement conditions can be very expensive. We also pay in time spent getting those repairs done.



What can we do? First, promptly report any problems you encounter. If those in charge don't know about a problem, you can bet it won't get fixed. Don't assume they already know about it or that someone else will call. The squeaky wheel principle applies: drawing more attention to a given problem increases the likelihood that action will be taken to correct it.

If there's a pothole or failing street surface in your neighborhood let the city know by calling Central Dispatch at (408) 277-4373 during regular work hours. You can also call the city's customer center anytime day or night at (408) 535-3500. Be ready to identify the address or location of the problem.

According to their website, San Jose has two city-wide pothole patch crews that respond to priority complaints within the next day after they are received. These crews are radio dispatched and carry cell phones.

If the problem is on a county road or expressway, call County Roads at (408) 494-2750. For freeways or state highways, call Caltrans at (408) 436-0930.

Second, after you've called in the problem, let VEP know about it by calling or emailing me or anyone listed on the mailing page of

this newsletter. We'll compile a list and submit it to the department and elected representative(s) of the appropriate jurisdiction.

Finally, if your car is damaged as a result of hitting a pothole, file a damage claim against the agency (city, county, etc.) that's responsible for the street or road. Please note, however, as reported in Dennis Rockstroh's November 5 Mercury-News Action Line column, "Jurisdictions are not responsible for damage caused by lack of road repair unless the pothole or other damage had been reported to the [responsible agency]."



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Obviously, calling to report a street repair need is important, both to get the problem fixed and to get help fixing your car if it's not

VEP's November general meeting

To begin the evening's program, VEP President Marilyn Rodgers introduced Kim Gaddis, SJPD Crime Prevention



Specialist, who discussed the city's Neighborhood Crime Prevention Program. It began in the 60s, focusing on neighborhood crime prevention and safety issues. (See article elsewhere in this newsletter or go to www.sjpd.org and click on "Neighborhood Watch" under the "Community Services" link.)

▶ Crime Stoppers' Ben Angeleris discussed his program, which rewards individuals who call to give tips that lead to an arrest and a conviction of criminals. Callers are kept anonymous and get rewards of up to \$1,000. In Silicon Valley, 97% of all tips have resulted in convictions.

Crime Stoppers is staffed solely by volunteers. This program exists in fifteen counties and 1,200 cities in the U.S. Billboard campaigns and private donations are the primary sources of funds; all donated funds go to rewards for crime solving tips.

- ▶Our meeting room was filled with many police officers, there to help us honor Police Captain **Jack Farmer** who retired early this year. He was given a plaque by VEP, expressing our sincere appreciation for all the contributions and support he and his department has provided the VEP community over the years. Captain Jack made a very impressive acceptance speech and many photos were taken to commemorate the event. He will be missed by all of us.
- ► San Jose City Council Member Nancy Pyle, and County Supervisor Don Gage, VTA Board Chairperson, gave a brief presentation of the status of various city and VTA issues/concerns.

Ms. Pyle announced that the city council will on December 12th vote on the right-of-way land acquisition for widening Branham Lane.

Both Ms. Pyle and Mr. Gage discussed VTA's housing and retail development proposal for the park-n-ride lot at the



southwest corner of Narvaez and Capitol Expressway. One community concern is an error in the current traffic Level of Service (LOS) rating, which has Capitol/Narvaez rated as LOS "B" (on a scale of "A" to "F"). Traffic there is gridlocked every weekday morning. Ms. Pyle will initiate a

recount of the traffic in the immediate area to determine a more appropriate LOS rating. This is being done to more fairly assess the impacts the proposed VTA project will have on traffic.

Mr. Gage expressed concerns over the proposed density of VTA's development proposal and his desire to choose a local developer for the project. Additionally, he was concerned that the VTA staff had made the developer selection, not the VTA Board. Gage also expressed concern over the fact that VTA staff did not notify the VEP community about this proposal.

Gage said he would offer a motion at VTA's meeting on De-

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cember 14th to begin the developer selection process anew. This delay will allow time for necessary traffic studies, refinement of VTA's developer selection criterion, and an improved public notification process.

- ► San Jose Unified School District Board Member **Veronica Lewis** gave a brief presentation on the proposed installation of stadium lights at Gunderson High School. A series of community meetings were announced)(see article in this newsletter).
- ▶ Dave Fadness announced that VEP has been granted a \$1959 San Jose Beautiful grant for landscaping the vacant lot

at the corner of Narvaez and Branham Lane. Our City Forest will donate thirty-three trees, Browning-Ferris Industries will donate 162 cubic yards of mulch, and we'll use the grant money to install an irrigation system. Two volunteer workdays have been scheduled for this work: Saturday, January 20th and Saturday, January 27th.



- ► The city will proceed with another traffic monitoring effort on Chynoweth Avenue. An update on traffic calming there is scheduled for VEP's January meeting.
- ▶VEP business consisted of voting on a motion to allocate an amount not to exceed \$500 for the VEP Executive Board's annual dinner. That motion was approved by members present.
- ▶ Our meeting ended after reminders for community donations to the Decker Christmas Tree Fund and to the Pearl Avenue Library Fund.

When shopping, stay aware of any personal belongings you keep in your shopping cart. Over the holiday season, shoppers at a local large retail store reported having their wallets

stolen from inside their purses when they briefly turned away from their shopping carts.

When you purchase gift cards, you may want to buy cards that are stored behind the counter instead of those out in plain sight. Crooks can write down a card's number, and then later

check if that card has been activated by an unsuspecting buyer. At that point they can make purchases from the store's web site using the card number.

If the card has a PIN number with a scratch-off covering, make sure that the card hasn't been tampered with.

Street light not working?

If you know of a city street light that's not working, here's how to get it repaired...



First, make a note of the number painted at about eye-level on the street light pole. Also make a note of the nearest street address or street name(s) where the defective light is located.

Then call the City of San Jose Street Light Maintenance Desk at (408) 277-5517. In addition to the pole number and location, they will want your name and phone number, the date

and time of your call, and whether you want a call-back.

You can also report broken streetlights by email or fax. Visit www.sanjoseca.gov/transportation/s_streetlights.htm for more information.

If it's a routine repair or lamp replacement, the city estimates no more than seven days to repair it. More complicated re-

pairs typically require no more than two weeks. My recent experience with street light replacement was very good—it only took a couple of days after my call.

Street lights are important for pedestrian and motorist safety and for deterring crime. Do your part: promptly report street lights that are not working.

Gone phishing

Phishing is the term used to describe sneaky ways crooks try to get you to reveal personal information via the internet or

phone so that they can access your bank account and so on. A few recent scams involve persons pretending to be from the IRS (bogus tax refund), Social Security Administration (bogus cost of living increase), or the local courthouse (bogus jury duty).



Just remember a simple rule: *never* give out your personal information to someone who contacts you. Only give your information to people *you* contact and trust.

Never use hyperlinks in emails you receive to access bank accounts, ebay accounts, and so on. Instead, open a new browser window, then go to the institution's official website, or call the institution by phone.

Don't keep your social security card in your wallet, and be very wary of giving your social security number to anyone.



How many of you have fallen for this one: Click here to view an e-card from a friend, now enter your email address and password. Guess what, no e-card. But pretty soon someone might start using your email account to send spam, so be sure to change your pass-

word immediately if you get fooled into giving it to a "phisherman".


