Busy VEP membership drive volunteers

Garbage and recycling rate increases?

You have by now received in the mail from the city a notice describing details of proposed step-wise increases for San Jose *Recycle Plus* rates for garbage and recycling services over the coming three years. This rate notice is also posted online at www.sanioseca.gov/esd/rates-notice.asp.

Proposed increases are obviously the fallout of city council garbage contract shenanigans that made headlines last year. Rate-payers are now being asked to fund what amounts to an 11 ± 1000 million back-door wage hike.

What's being proposed is increases for all types of services. For example, a 29% first-year increase is recommended for the curbside single-family household rate (from \$20.15 to \$25.99 per month for a 32-gallon garbage cart). The rate for an optional yard trimmings cart will rise 60% (from \$2.50 to \$4.00 per month). Rates are also being proposed for commercial businesses and multi-family complexes.

The San Jose City Council will be holding a public hearing on May 8, 2007 regarding these proposals. That hearing will be held at 1:30 pm in the City Hall Council Chambers, 200 East Santa Clara Street.

If approved, the proposed rates for Fiscal Year 2007-08 will become effective on July 1, 2007. The May 8 public hearing will also cover proposed maximum increases for *Recycle Plus* in Fiscal Year 2008-09 and Fiscal Year 2009-10. **Proposed are additional increases of 10% in both 2008-09 and 2009-10.**

If you wish to protest the proposed Recycle Plus service rate increases, the city must receive your written protest prior to the close of the public hearing on May 8, 2007.



<u>Note</u>: For your protest to be counted, you must indicate the Assessor's Parcel Number(s) of the San Jose property or properties you own that are subject to the proposed rate adjustment. The Assessor's Parcel Number for your property is shown on your property tax statement—and is included on the letter you received from the city. One letter can be used to protest increases on all of your San Jose properties, but all Assessor's Parcel Number(s) must be listed therein.

Please pass this information to your friends and family who own property in San Jose—urge them to file a written protest <u>before</u> the May 8 deadline.



We will also present our At-Large Community Service Award at this meeting.

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Neighborhood scuttlebutt

- Dave Fadness & Dave Noel Branham Lane widening project: No news to report.

Chynoweth at Pearl: At our January 30th General Meeting, VEP members reported to San Jose Department of Transportation Neighborhood Traffic Manager **Laura Wells** that timing problems needed to be fixed at the Bran-

ham/Pearl traffic light. Laura Wells reported to VEP recently that the problem has been fixed, reducing the wait time for a green light when there is no cross traffic.



<u>Chynoweth palm tree</u>: On February 10th, another large palm tree was hit and destroyed in the Chynoweth median just east of Pearl Avenue. City Council Member **Nancy Pyle**'s office is looking into getting the old stump removed and a new tree planted.

<u>Branham median fence at Narvaez</u>: In the February VEP News, we reported that a driver hit several sections of chain link fence in the median of Branham on the east slope of the Hwy 87 overpass west of Narvaez. San Jose's Department of Transportation repaired the fence in mid-February. At our request, they also extended the fence to the Narvaez crosswalk. Improving safety by encouraging pedestrians to cross Branham at the crosswalk instead of jaywalking has been a long-time goal of VEP's. VEP sent a letter of thanks to **Ray Martinez** of DOT.

Happy Hollow Park and Zoo: In July 2008, Happy Hollow Park and Zoo will close for eight months of major renovations. These are the first major renovations since the park opened 46 years ago. The park will get new rides and attractions, a restaurant, a redesigned main entry with colorful artwork, and a 550-space parking lot. If you have an old cell phone or pager you'd like to recycle, consider donating it to Happy Hollow's cell phone recycling program. You'll get a tax receipt and proceeds will support Happy Hollow. <u>Route 87-Capitol-Narvaez:</u> VTA's *Capitol Light Rail Station Area Preliminary Traffic Operations Investigation Draft Final Report* was released for our review early last month. This study was done in conjunction with VTA's proposal for highdensity development to replace the south park-n-ride lot. It examined existing traffic conditions in the Route 87-Capitol-Narvaez interchange area, adding the effects of proposed residential and commercial uses. The study report included a preliminary list of possible remedies.

As expected, our first-hand experience was officially validated: serious traffic congestion already exists there, in particular at the northbound approach to Route 87 on Narvaez Avenue. Replacing the park-n-ride lot with a high-density project would worsen already unacceptable traf-

fic congestion. Importantly, the study also shows that portions of the same land VTA wants to develop will be needed to build traffic mitigation (new freeway approach and exit ramps, etc.).



VEP has reviewed the study with representatives of neighboring community associations. We decided to first invite **Nancy Pyle** to address our ongoing request to have the city's official level-of-service rating changed there to reflect existing conditions. We believe a solution will never be worked on until the problem is officially acknowledged by the City of San Jose. Our second step is to have a panel of city and county elected representatives and transportation officials participate in a panel discussion at our May 22 VEP meeting. They will present the study's findings to our members, answer our questions, and discuss possible solutions and a strategy to resolve daily traffic congestion at this notorious interchange.

Our goal is to formulate a local consensus on an acceptable solution and a strategy to obtain funding. With that, we can begin lobbying at regional, state, and federal levels, as will probably be necessary.

Update on Chynoweth-Pearl signal timing

At VEP's January meeting, one of the issues of concern voiced by members was the signal timing at the intersection of Pearl and Chynoweth; especially the long wait time for westbound motorists. San Jose's Department of Transportation (DOT) researched this problem and sent the following message to us:

"The DOT Signal Team has reset the signal timing at this intersection. The timing was previously set to return automatically to a green phase for the eastbound left-turn and through movements if no other vehicles were present in any of the other lanes, as these are the heavi-



est movements at this intersection. In addition, the minimum green time had previously been set to 20 seconds. The minimum green time has been reduced to 10 seconds, which will reduce the wait time for westbound motorists."

Pearl Avenue Library update

• Water your lawn in the morning or the evening, when temperatures are usually cooler and you will lose less moisture to evaporation.

• Buy products in bulk. Larger containers use less packaging than several smaller containers.

• If you can't get a leaky faucet fixed right away, collect the water in a container and use it for cooking, drinking or watering household plants.



• Buy rechargeable batteries. These will save you money in the long run, and you'll keep toxic disposable batteries from ending up in landfills.

• Keep the tires on your car properly inflated to maximize your gas mileage.

• Switch to compact fluorescent light bulbs. These need less energy to provide the same amount of light as an incandescent bulb.

Text message scam

Here's another scam to watch out for. A thief or pickpocket steals your cell phone, then looks though its contact list for a name such as "Hubby". The thief sends a text message to that number asking for private information, such as your bank account PIN number. By the time you realize what happened, your bank account is empty.

To prevent this type of scam, avoid disclosing the relationship between you and the people in your contact list. Avoid using names like Home, Honey, Hubby, and sweetheart, Dad, Mom etc. Also, if you get a strange request by text message, confirm by calling back.

Annuals for the summer

By now the perennials and bulbs you planted are in full swing! Continue to care for these plants, providing them proper nutrients, moisture, light, and protection from pests and diseases. The last step in completing your planting is to add annuals and roses to the garden. Consult your garden plan before heading off to pick up these plants. Know what types of annuals and roses will grow healthy and successfully in your garden.

• There are so many varieties to choose from, consult a plant encyclopedia to choose the best annual and rose varieties for your garden.

• When selecting annuals at the nursery or garden center review plants to see that they are pest and disease free, with no holes in the leaves or discolored edges: look for healthy leaf color, and see that the roots are not overcrowded.

• Once you have your annuals home from the nursery get them into the ground or container as soon as possible. Planting will allow you to get the annuals the proper nutrients and moisture they need to begin developing roots.

• When planting annuals, make sure to properly amend your existing soil. We recommend using *Miracle-Gro Garden Soil for Flowers and Vegetables* to improve the condition of the soil and provide essential nutrients needed by your plants.



• To make the most of the annuals you have, plant them in groups or staggered, depending on the size of the garden.

• If you are planting in containers try to place the annuals that will grow tallest in the center and from there, plant the remaining plants in descending height toward the edge of the container. This will keep shorter plants from competing for light with the taller plants.

• Before placing annuals into the soil, gently break apart roots that have become overgrown. Removing the matted tangles before planting will allow roots to grow strong once in the ground.

• Keep your annuals growing strong and healthy with the proper nutrients. Feed them every other week with *Miracle-Gro All Purpose Water Soluble Plant Food.*

Another booster for your roses and annuals is a homemade start-up meal. Mix one tablespoon of liquid dish soap, one ta-

blespoon of hydrogen peroxide, one teaspoon of vitamin B-1 starter, and one teaspoon of whiskey in a half-gallon of warm water. Treating your plants occasionally will help them perk up and bloom.

~ Black mold on oranges ~

When you go to pick your oranges, you may notice black "dirt" on the oranges and leaves. You may also notice a lot of scale all over the trees.

The "dirt" is called sooty mold. The scale comes from aphids, mealy bugs and other sap-sucking insects that eat more sap



than they can digest and exude the excess. It all falls to the fruit and leaves below, and a fungus grows on this exudate. Sooty mold grows only on the surface and can be washed off. The exudate is sweet and serves as a food source for ants.

To control the scale, prevent ants from climbing the tree, and natural predators will

usually take care of the scale. To stop ants, wrap a threeinch-wide band of masking tape around the trunk and spread sticky goo (tanglefoot) on the tape. Although the ants can't cross the tape, they will look for other ways to get at the food that they scent. You have to remove any branches, twigs or leaves touching any structure or another shrub or tree, as they will follow the scent.

~ Degenerate tomatoes ~

Tomatoes in our area can be infected by two soil-inhabiting fungi, verticillium wilt and fusarium wild. Both can cause the fruit to become deformed, stay small, and the leaves turn brown, but the most likely culprit is fusarium wilt. These two fungal disease persist in the soil for up to 20 years and affect many other plants, as well.

Do not plant tomatoes in the same place in your garden. Rotating the area where tomatoes are to be planted is an old but effective practice. If possible, plant only those that are labeled VFN (verticillium-, fusarium- and nematode-resistant). These will help prevent the spread of the diseases.

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Upcoming gardening tasks...

~ APRIL ~

SNAPSHOT: Warmer days mean soil is welcoming to just about everything.

FLOWERS: Six-packs and pots of annuals and perennials will tempt you. Cosmos and nasturtiums are easy from seed-grow the gorgeous soft yellow climber called "Moonlight" on a fence or trellis. Plant sunflowers in stages so you'll have continuous blooms throughout the summer. Try a new color combo of Angel's Halo (Yellow), the Joker (bi-color red and yellow) and Chocolate Cherry (deep burgundy). Put in begonias, dahlias, glads, callas and cannas. Late month, after frost danger has passed, put in tropical hibiscus, jacaranda, bougainvillea.

VEGETABLES: Plant summer vegetables, herbs and ornamental gourds. Mid-month, put in cucumbers, peppers and tomatoes. Check out the vast selection of plants (in particular, luscious heirloom tomato varieties) at the popular annual Spring Garden Market organized by the Master Gardeners of Santa Clara County. For date and location, check www.mastergardeners.org.

TO-DO LIST: Feed acid lovers such as azaleas, camellias and rhododendrons after they finish blooming. Roll out new sod or sow' grass seed. Spray apple and pear trees for codling moths after the petals have dropped. Make plans to attend the Going Native Garden Tour, April 29 in locations all over Santa Clara County (details: www.goingnativegardentour.org).

~ MAY ~

SNAPSHOT: We're in full swing now. Water deeply (don't just sprinkle). Smart buys: sun-loving tomatoes and peppers.

FLOWERS: Plant now: hot-weather annuals such as asters, cosmos, marigolds, petunias and portulacas. Pinch azaleas, fuchsias, mandevillas and marguerites for bushier plants. Give roses a good feed.

VEGETABLES: Reseed or transplant seedlings every three weeks for successive harvests of beans, corn and squash. Plant pumpkins, melons, and gourds. Put in extra and designate it for the Good Neighbor Gardens project, where gardeners donate their produce to help out food banks and community centers, For a free starter kit from the Mercury News, call (408) 920-5241.

TO-DO LIST: Build water basins around shrubs, trees and roses to catch every drop, and add mulch to hold in moisture. Plant avocado, citrus, and other tender trees. Watch for snails and slugs; handpick, if you can stand it. Otherwise, the safest product on the market is iron phosphate.

DO <u>NOT</u> **TOP TREES**: Topping trees is very harmful to proper tree growth and appearance. When a tree is topped, it is shocked into producing fast growth to the sides of the topped branches. The new growth will look very unnatural as it matures over time, and will also be weaker than normal growth. For full details, see your April 2006 VEP News

~ April ~

TOP JOB: Replace batteries of smoke, heat, and gas detectors.

ALSO: Inspect home from bottom to top, looking for damage

that occurred over the winter. Prepare a to-do list of needed repairs.



Do spring cleanup. Wash walls and windows; clean carpeting, upholstery, and window cov-

Check doors and windows for proper operation. Lubricate hinges and tighten loose hinge screws. Apply clear wood floor wax to door edges that rub.

~ Mav ~

TOP JOB: Check furnace filter. Clean or replace if necessary. Do furnace or central air-conditioning maintenance recommended by the unit's manufacturer.

ALSO: Clean and prepare swimming pool, pond or fountain. Repair cracks in driveways, walkways and sidewalks.

Check that vent screens to attic or crawl space are not damaged. Repair or replace as needed. Remove accumulated mineral deposits from shower heads and aerators by soaking them in or scrubbing with white vinegar. (Wear eye protection.)

~ Each month ~

- Test and inspect smoke, heat, and gas detectors.
- Check fire extinguishers. Replace or service as needed.
- Check to be certain nothing flammable is near a source of flame, such as a water heater pilot light, gas range, furnace, etc.
- Practice your family fire-escape plan and review earthquake preparedness. Inspect electrical cords for damage. Repair or replace if needed.
- Check the operation of all electrical circuit breakers by turning each off and on. Do the same with ground fault circuit interrupters, usually found in bathroom, kitchen, garage, and outdoor outlets. Replace those not working properly.



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- Always be alert for other safety hazards, such as cracked walkways, hazardous materials that aren't properly stored, or unsecured heavy bookcases or other furniture that could topple during an earthquake.
- Check water softener. Add salt if needed.
- Clean garbage disposal by grinding up two trays of ice cubes made from a mixture of 1 cup white vinegar in 1 gallon of water. (Be certain to use the disposer cap when grinding.) For a pleasant smell, follow the cleaning by grinding a lemon.

Free repairs for low-income homeowners

Rebuilding Together, formerly Christmas in April, is a nonprofit organization that brings together volunteers to provide repair work for low-income homeowners and non-profit facilities at no cost to the applicant. Rebuilding Together projects

are primarily one and two-day projects, held each spring and fall. Throughout the year, the Neighbor-to-Neighbor program performs repairs that improve accessibility and mobility in the home.



Repair work focuses on neighborhood revitalizations and safety improvements such as grab

bar and railing installation and repairs such as minor plumbing, flooring, electrical and carpentry. Additional work can also include interior or exterior painting.

We are currently looking for homeowners that need warmth, safety, and independence repairs for our April Rebuilding Days program.

Rebuilding Together is the nation's largest volunteer home repair agency. Last year our Silicon Valley affiliate repaired and rehabbed 95 homes and non-profit facilities, utilizing 1500 volunteers.

Don't make it easy to steal your wheels

In the United States, a vehicle is stolen every 21 seconds. Stolen cars, vans, trucks, and motorcycles cost victims time and money--and increase everyone's insurance premiums. They're also often used to commit other crimes.

Don't become a victim of this serious crime.

~ The basic prevention policy ~

Never leave your car running or the keys in the ignition when you're away from it, even for "just a minute."

Always roll up the windows and lock the car, even if it's in front of your home.

Never leave valuables in plain view, even if your car is locked. Put them in the trunk or at least out of sight. Buy radios and tape and CD players that can be removed and locked in the trunk.

Park in busy, well-lighted areas.

Carry the registration and insurance cards with you. Don't leave personal identification documents or credit cards in your

vehicle.

• When you pay to park in a lot or garage, leave just the ignition (or a "valet") key with the attendant. Make sure no personal information is attached. Do the same when you take your car for repairs.

\sim Add extra protection \sim

• Install a mechanical locking device --commonly called clubs, collars, or j-bars--that locks to the steering wheel, column, or brake to prevent the wheel from being turned more than a few degrees. Use it!

• Investigate security systems if you live in a high-theft area or drive an automobile that's an attractive target for thieves. You may get a discount on your auto insurance.

• Look into CAT (Combat Auto Theft) and HEAT (Help Eliminate Auto Theft) partnership programs where individuals voluntarily register their cars with the police, and allow the police to stop the car during certain hours when they normally would not be driving (such as midnight to 5 am). All participants display decals in a designated area on their vehicles.



~ What about carjacking? ~

Carjacking, stealing a car by force, has captured headlines in the last few years. Statistically, your chances of being a carjacking victim are very slim, and preventive actions can reduce the risk even more.

• Etch the vehicle identification number (VIN) on the windows, doors, fenders, and trunk lid. This helps discourage professional thieves who have to either remove or replace etched parts before selling the car. Copy the VIN and your tag number on a card and keep it in a safe place. If your vehicle is stolen, the police need this information.

• Approach your car with the key in hand. Look around and inside before getting in.

• When driving, keep your car doors locked and windows rolled up at all times.

• Be especially alert at intersections, gas stations, ATMs, shopping malls, convenience and grocery stores--all are windows of opportunity for carjackers.

• Park in well-lighted areas that have good visibility and are close to walkways, stores, and people.

• If the carjacker has a weapon, give up the car with no questions asked. Your life is worth more than a car.

~ Beware of the "Bump-and-Rob" ~

It works like this: A car, usually with a driver and at least one passenger, rear-ends or "bumps" you in traffic. You get out to check the damage. The driver or one of the passengers jumps into your car and drives off.

If you're bumped by another car, look around before you get out. Make sure there are other cars around, then check out the car that's rear-ended you and who's in it. It the situation makes you uneasy, stay in your car and insist on moving to a police station or busy, well-lighted area to exchange information.

~ Be on the lookout ~

If your car is stolen, report it to the police immediately.
 Also, report abandoned cars to the local agency that handles
 removal.



• When buying a used car from an individual or a dealer, make sure you have the proper titles, that the VIN number is intact, and that the "federal sticker" is on the inside of the driver's door. That sticker should match the VIN.



• Suggest that any dealer, rental car agency, or auto repair shop that you use display auto theft prevention information in their waiting rooms.

• If joyriding is a problem in your community, work to improve recreational programs and job opportunities for young people.

Year-end evaluation: VEP Goals & Objectives -Dave Fadness

During the summer months each year, VEP executives prepare a set of Goals & Objectives for the coming year. These G&O are presented to our members, debated, amended, and



approved by formal vote at our September meeting. Although they can be amended at any regularly scheduled meeting by a vote of members, these G&O set the course for VEP activities until another set is formally adopted.

You'll notice that some of our G&O are more general in nature (like, for example, Goal 4. "Monitor, Create, and Maintain High-Quality Public Services for VEP Area.") So, beyond simply being a task list, these more general G&O also allow our executives to act in members' behalf when issues arise unexpectedly between monthly meetings.

VEP's G&O have always stretched the limit on what can reasonably be expected from an all-volunteer organization--we aim high. Whereas most organizations, even governments and businesses, have a mere handful of such directives, VEP takes on many—some say, too many. Keep that in mind as you read through the following evaluation; whereas we failed to take action on each and every item, there were many—and some are actually multi-year tasks.

All are worthwhile, but our success in achieving "a straight-A" report card relies on member involvement. Our small and very busy executive committee cannot do it without a broad network of neighbors who are willing to help.

If you see something listed that you wish had received more attention, or know of something that should be added, please come to any VEP meeting, bring it to our attention, and volunteer to help. Together we can make a <u>big</u> difference, much more so than if "you go it alone".

For your review, here's our self-evaluation. Please bring your comments and suggestions to our April 24 meeting.

~ VEP 2006-07 Goals & Objectives ~

1. Continue to improve our community and our association.

- A. Values: Place first priority on volunteer efforts that reflect member-endorsed improvements in our community. [Grade = A.]
- B. Leadership: Encourage regular turn-over of VEP Officers to impart broad, area-wide membership representation, fresh ideas, new perspectives, and peak energy in our organization. [Grade = C. While we have expanded our board with new members and fresh ideas, and increased representation of the east-of-Vistapark area, we did not groom new members or have a succession plan for 2007-08.]
- C. Membership: Continue to increase paid membership. [Grade = B.]
- D. Meetings: Encourage attendance at VEP meetings and events. [*Grade* = A.]
- E. Fiscal Health: Continue to maintain VEP's positive fiscal condition. [*Grade* = *A*.]
- F. Communication:
 - a) Continue publishing the VEP Newsletter nine times per year. [Grade = A.]
- b) Continue development and encourage usage of VEP Website; develop a content guide. [Grade = A. We launched and kept up-to-date a new website, held two Electronic Communications Committee meetings, and transitioned to a new webmaster, who attends executive board meetings and is willing to serve as an elected officer if we add a Director of Electronic Communications position in our By-Laws.]
- c) Provide and cultivate a means of interactive member communications (such as expanding our current e-list and/or establishing a community forum on the VEP Website). [Grade = C; work in process. We have discussed concepts at committee meetings and researched and tested e-list software options.]
- d) Utilize e-mail messages to communicate with members, particularly in months when our newsletter is not published. [Grade = A. In addition to sending timely and well-edited emails, we also implemented an automated method of sending them.]
- e) Continue to develop relationships with local media outlets and submit for publication articles about VEP. [Grade = A. We've had exemplary success in our relationship with the Blossom Valley Times, getting many cover stories on VEP events, VEP guest articles, and regular coverage of our calendar of events.]

G. Visibility: Increase VEP's public recognition through local signage, newsletters, event flyers, partnering with local businesses, schools, and other community associations; and through contributing articles to other community publications. [Grade = A. We updated VEP signs]

to reflect our new meeting location. We widely promoted our Election Forums and Branham-Narvaez planting event city-wide. We distributed several flyers to the community to promote VEP events, recognition, and membership. We invited members of Rancho Narvaez Neighborhood Association to join VEP.]



- H. Volunteerism: Increase opportunities for VEP members to volunteer by:
 - a) Developing functional committees that will expand leadership opportunities and cultivate new talent for future VEP Executive Board positions. [Grade = C.]
 - b) Supporting our Volunteer Coordinator. [Grade = C. Our Volunteer Coordinator resigned. We updated our remit envelopes and membership database to identify specific member volunteer interests.]

- c) Supporting our Hospitality Coordinator. [Grade = C.]
- d) Continue developing, and share with committee chairs a VEP database of volunteers by activity and time preferences. [Grade = D. We updated our remit envelopes and membership database to identify specific member volunteer interests; however, we still need to improve our process of connecting volunteers with project leaders.]
- e) Continue developing and advertising additional volunteer activities, e.g. structured committees. [Grade = D. We list current volunteer opportunities in our newsletter and on our website, but we have not yet established any new structured committees.]
- f) Schedule one major event per year to recognize and thank VEP volunteers. [Grade = A. We held our first annual volunteer recognition celebration at our January General Meeting.]

g) Continue process of thanking volunteers for their time and talent in VEP communications. [Grade = A.]

h) Improve/formalize the process of hospitality/outreach to new residents of VEP. [Grade = C. The database person enters new owners from the Mercury News Real Estate section and mails them a newsletter.]


- i) Develop a VEP brochure describing VEP's history and mission, including information on committees and major yearly events. [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]
- I. Review and update VEP's Constitution and Bylaws:

 [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]

- d) Formalize the process for filling vacant Executive Board positions. [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]

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- f) Consider and propose changing our program/fiscal year to begin with May (rather than the current month of April). [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]
- J. Consider and propose incorporating VEP as a 501c3 non-profit organization. [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]
- 2. Promote Community Interaction, Pride, and Preparedness.
- **A.** Encourage member participation in neighborhood safety programs, crime prevention, and disaster/emergency preparedness. [Grade = C. We had presentations on Neighborhood Watch and Crimestoppers, but did not launch any new initiatives.]
- B. Participate in at least two major beautification projects, such as San Jose Beautiful's annual Daffodil Day planting; and landscaping the vacant parcel at Branham and Narvaez. [Grade = A.

Participated in Daffodil Day; installed irrigation, planted 40 trees, and mulched at and near Branham-Narvaez.]



C. Continue to organize and encourage participation in at least two pruning and community cleanup projects, such as the Chynoweth palm tree pruning

events. [Grade = A. We pruned Chynoweth palm trees and the Hwy 87 bike path behind Gunderson, maintain the Vistapark Drive cul-de-sac, maintain the oleanders on Vistapark Drive, maintain trees at Parkview School, and maintain the median islands on Narvaez/Branham and Chynoweth/Pearl. (A VEP Beautification & Maintenance Committee is needed.)]

- D. Continue encouraging graffiti removal when/where ever it occurs in and around our area. [Grade = B. We paintout graffiti at Vista Park, on the Canoas Creek Bridge, and on the Branham Lane sound wall.]
- E. Continue to sponsor, promote, and underwrite these annual VEP events: the Home Faire [*Grade = A*], our Community-wide Garage Sale [now scheduled for May 5], and our Memorial Day Parade & Festival [now scheduled



for May 28].

3. Work to Assure Local Government and Businesses' Responsiveness and Accountability to VEP Members.

- A. Sponsor Election Forums that heighten our members' awareness of candidates and ballot issues, and encourages their participation as informed voters in all elections. [Grade = A. VEP led a joint VEP/Almaden Valley Community Association forum for mayoral and water district candidates. VEP also held a DA candidate forum. VEP had newly elected Mayor Chuck Reed as a speaker at our January General Meeting.]
- B. Work with City/County government and developers to install and/or maintain landscaping in the VEP membership area; e.g.,
- a) South end of Vistapark (at Hyde Park) [Grade = A. VEP signed an Adopt-A-Street agreement with the city in which VEP will supply the labor and the city will provide supplies needed for maintaining this landscaped area.]
- b) Vistapark at Branham (along the new wall) [Grade = B. City performed irrigation repairs. Some oleanders still need to be replaced. Trees in median south of Branham need pruning.]
- c) Capital Expressway medians [Grade = Inc. (No activity.) Pruning needed.]
- d) Chynoweth medians [East of Pearl, Grade = A. West of Pearl, Grade = C; dead shrubs, lots of weeds. VEP



rescued a tree west of Pearl that was hit by a car. Most but not all palm trees east of Pearl that were destroyed by auto accidents were replaced by the city.]

e) Narvaez median [*Grade = A. Several shrubs* need replacing, but this site looks very well maintained.]

C. Work with the City of San Jose to provide for traffic safety measures and traffic calming on VEP streets which have become heavily traveled; e.g.,

- a) Chynoweth between Pearl and New World-Gaundabert [Grade = A. Brought VEP membership to a consensus on traffic calming implementation specifics, including a decision not to pursue a single-lane option at this time. The city made many changes in signage and striping and installed automated speed monitoring signs. Still waiting for bike lanes.]
- b) Hyde Park between Chynoweth and Vistapark (to Branham) [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]
- c) New Compton to Massachusetts to Chynoweth and

visa-a-versa [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]

- d) Bluefield to Rosenbaum to Capitol and Snell [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]
- e) Kingspark Drive [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]
- D. Continue to monitor community impacts (including increased traffic and parking) resulting from uses of Gunderson High School and the new Vistapark Community Room. [Grade = A. Advertised and participated in Gunderson stadium lights community meetings.]
- E. Encourage, monitor, and react to plans for urban development, transportation, libraries, parks and other public infrastructure changes in and around our membership area. Organize and communicate community priorities and concerns. [Grade = A.]

4. Monitor, Create, and Maintain High-Quality Public Services for VEP Area.

- A. Promote and participate in planning and development of the Martial-Cottle Regional Park (Lester Property). [Grade = A. In monthly contact. Submitted candidate volunteers for citizen committee. Waiting for county to move forward with project planning.]
- B. Monitor traffic and other issues along Branham Lane. Continue VEP member involvement during the design and construction process of widening Branham between Vistapark and Snell Avenue, and other improvements between Vistapark and Narvaez. [Grade = A. In monthly contact. Waiting for city to move forward with project planning.]
- C. Monitor and provide input to the City's Capital Improvement Plan for our neighborhood's needs. [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]
- **D.** Work with the City to develop, renovate, and maintain our neighborhood parks. Monitor adequate services for maintenance of Vista Park Community Room and bathroom facilities. [*Grade* = *A*.]
- E. Work with the City to develop a master plan for the immediate area surrounding the Vista Park Community Room. [Grade = C. VEP proposed this. PRNS and council office has agreed to do it, but no action has been taken by the city to date.]
- F. Monitor opportunities to build a city park at Capitol/ Narvaez. [Grade = A; VEP work in process but no official acceptance to date of concept.]
- **G.** Monitor the city's Adopt-A-Park program within our traditional membership area to assure that each park is adopted, and volunteer efforts are sustained. [Grade = C. Although our Adopt-A-Park volunteers are doing a good job, not all area parks have been adopted yet.]

 H. Monitor opportunities for improvements in traffic level of service at Capitol/Narvaez/northbound 87 onramp. [Grade = A; work in process. Participated in VTA meet-

ings regarding proposed development at the south park-n-ride lot, causing the project to be delayed while the proposal process is improved and traffic considerations are evaluated. Working with Nancy Pyle to correct a traffic level-ofservice error that fails to require



mitigation for traffic impacts to northbound Hwy 87 traffic gridlock caused by area development. Hosting a City/ County/VTA panel discussion on traffic solutions at our May General Meeting.]

- I. Work for measures aimed at eliminating red-light running on Capitol Expressway. [Grade = Inc. (No activity.)]
- J. Work for improved street conditions and strict enforce-

ment of traffic laws in and around our area. Emphasize the need for VEP members to observe and comply with traffic laws, doing our part to improve neighborhood safety. [Grade = B. Worked successfully for safety improvements on Chynoweth Avenue. We hosted a Street Smarts presentation at our September General Meeting.]

- **K.** Work with the City to ensure that impacts of any proposed high-density development along the Guadalupe Corridor are fully mitigated. [*Grade = A; work in process. See item 4H.*]
- L. Monitor design, development, and building of new library facilities at Pearl Avenue and at Branham and Monterey Road (the new Edenvale facility). [Pearl, Grade = A. Edenvale, Grade = F (no VEP activity).]
- M. Monitor and encourage continued construction of wheelchair access ramps on street corners in our neighborhoods. [The city is doing this; no VEP activity.]

That's all there is to it!


