

Our September 23rd meeting will include the following topics:

- ▶ <u>Vista Park Community Room Landscaping Plan</u>. The final Community Room Landscaping Plan and project schedule will be presented by San Jose City Parks and Recreation Department's **Evelyn Velez-Rosario**. VEP volunteers will be called upon soon to plant trees and shrubs. This meeting will be an excellent opportunity to see what's going to be done and when our help will be needed.
- ▶ 2008-09 VEP Goals & Objectives. Our executive officers have put together a set of proposed Goals and Objectives for the coming year (see article in this newsletter). Your input is needed to be sure what's planned reflects VEP member's desires—and that their list is complete. Your input is wanted; your endorsement is required.
- ▶ <u>Proposed VEP 2008-09 Budget</u>. VEP's Treasurer **Ginger Cardona** will present our proposed budget for 2008-2009 (see article in this newsletter). We need your vote of approval.

- ▶ <u>Proposed changes to VEP Constitution & Bylaws</u>: After decades without major amendment, our executive officers are proposing a set of changes to our charter that will modernize VEP's organization (see article in this newsletter). All changes to our Constitution & Bylaws require member approval.
- ▶ Your input. We always leave time to hear from you regarding concerns or issues that we can work together in resolving. This approach continues to keep VEP neighborhoods strong, healthy, and attractive.

We look forward to seeing you, your family, your friends, and your neighbors at our September 23rd meeting. Please join us!

VEP's Goals & Objectives for 2008-09

Each September, VEP members adopt a set of Goals & Objectives (G&O) for the coming year. Adopted G&O serve thereafter as marching orders for VEP executives when acting on behalf of our membership. At the close of our program year next spring, we report and grade ourselves on how well we met them.

We will ask for your input and vote on the following proposed G&O at our September 23rd meeting. If any changes are adopted at that meeting, they will be published in our October newsletter.

VEP Board-Recommended ★ 2008-09 Goals & Objectives ★

- 1. Continue to improve our community and our association.
- A. Values: Place first priority on volunteer efforts that reflect member-endorsed improvements in our community.
- B. Leadership: Encourage regular turn-over of VEP Officers to impart broad, area-wide membership representation.
- C. Membership: Monitor changes in paid VEP membership.
- D. Meetings: Encourage and monitor attendance at VEP meetings and events.
- E. Fiscal Health: Continue to maintain VEP's positive fiscal condition.
 - a. Investigate and foster the use of Grants (and any other possible sources) to increase funding available for VEP projects
- F. Communication:
 - a. Continue publishing the VEP NEWS nine times per year.
 (1) Immediately identify and groom replacement/assistant Newsletter Editor
 - b. Monitor and increase the usage of the VEP Website.
- c. Utilize e-mail to communicate important VEP business with members.

2008 is VEP's 39th year!

- d. Maintain relationships with local media outlets and submit for publication articles about VEP.
- G. Strive to increase VEP's public and social recognition.
 - a. Increase VEP visibility at appropriate events
- H. Volunteerism: Increase opportunities for VEP members to volunteer by:
 - Developing ad hoc committees that will expand leadership opportunities and cultivate new talent for future VEP Executive Board positions.
 - b. Maintaining a VEP database of volunteers by activity (including general meeting attendance) with the intent of using it as a reference for future VEP officer grooming increasing participation in future VEP volunteer activities. The database needs to clearly indicate year(s) the member checked their membership forms.
 - Developing and advertising additional volunteer activities, making use of the database mentioned above in item 1.H.b to increase our effectiveness.
- I. Complete Final Review and update VEP's Constitution and Bylaws to likely:
 - Consider changes in the composition of our Executive Board that could improve our effectiveness.
 - b. Consider a formal structure for both standing and ad hoc committees.
 - Consider changes to our Community Service Award program.
 - d. Formalize a process for filling vacant Executive Board positions.
 - e. Consider changes to our program/fiscal year.
- J. Move forward with incorporating VEP as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization.
- 2. Promote Community Interaction, Pride, and Preparedness.
 - A. Encourage member participation in neighborhood safety programs, crime prevention, and disaster/emergency preparedness.
 - B. Organize and encourage participation in pruning, community cleanup, and maintenance projects.
 - C. Identify and encourage graffiti removal when/where ever it occurs in and around our area.
 - D. Continue to sponsor, promote, and underwrite our Home Faire, community-wide Garage Sale, and Memorial Day event.
 - a. Put more marketing "spin" on our self-promotion material to increase focus and avoid overly wordy laundry lists
 - E. Develop plans to address the following
 - a. Chynoweth landscaping improvements
 - (1) Specific attention to the North side between New World



and Pearl.

- b. Vista Park Improvements
- 3. Work to Assure Local Government and Businesses' Responsiveness and Accountability to VEP Members.
 - A. Sponsor Election Forums that heighten our members' awareness of candidates and ballot issues, and encourages their participation as informed voters in all elections.
 - B. Work with City/County government and developers to install and/or maintain public landscaping in the VEP membership area.
 - C. Work with the City to provide traffic safety measures on VEP area streets as needed
 - D. Continue to monitor community impacts including increased traffic and parking
 - E. Encourage, monitor, and react to plans for urban development, transportation, libraries, parks and other public infrastructure changes in and around our membership area.
 - a. Organize and communicate community priorities and concerns
- 4. Monitor, Create, and Maintain High-Quality Public Services for the VEP Area
 - A. Promote and participate in planning and development of the Martial-Cottle Regional Park (Lester Property).
 - B. Continue VEP member involvement during the design and construction process of widening Branham between Vistapark and Snell Avenue, and other improvements between Vistapark and Narvaez.
 - C. Work with the City to develop and maintain our neighborhood parks.
 - D. Work with the City to implement the master plan for the immediate area surrounding the Vista Park Community Room and secure funding for the plans implementation.
 - E. Monitor opportunities to build a city park at Capitol/Narvaez.
 - F. Work for real improvements in traffic level of service at Capitol/Narvaez/northbound 87 onramp.
 - G. Work with the City to ensure that impacts of any proposed development along the Guadalupe Corridor are fully mitigated.


VEP is Accepting Local Advertisers

It's time to adopt our operating budget. We do this in September each year. VEP members are welcome to comment, request changes, add or subtract items, then vote on the resulting document at our regular meeting on 9/23. Be sure to participate.

Based on past experience and our proposed 2008-09 Goals & Objectives (see article in this newsletter), this is our proposed budget recommended by VEP officers:

VEP Constitution and By-Laws Update

After over a year of committee work, our executive board is ready to present a proposed major update to our Constitution and By-Laws (C&BL) for your consideration at our September 23rd general meeting

An amendment to our constitution can be enacted by a simple majority vote; a bylaws amendment requires a two-thirds majority vote of the members present at a general membership meeting, provided that the members are notified in writing at least 48-hours before the meeting. This article serves as your notification

Our last major C&BL update was adopted in November 2001. The main change addressed in that update was the addition of the "At Large" category to our annual Community Service Awards.

In the current proposal, we are proposing several significant changes. This article provides a summary of those changes. The full text of the current and proposed C&BL documents are available for review on our website at www.vepca.net. If you lack computer access, contact me at 266-7183 for hardcopies.

Executive Board and Executive Committee: Our current Executive Board and Executive Committee would be replaced with a 7-member Board of Directors. VEP members would annually elect a Board of Directors, and then the board would elect its own officers to include a President, Vice President, Treasurer, and any other officers deemed necessary. Board director duties would be reallocated. A Board quorum would consist of 4 members. The Board would be authorized to appoint, or schedule a membership vote to elect, a replacement for a vacated Board position.

The primary objective of this new structure is to create general leadership positions that enable new members to join the board and "learn the ropes" before stepping up to higher office. This should facilitate recruiting and training new leadership.

Our current Executive Committee consists of the following elected positions: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Editor. Our current Executive Board consists of our Executive Committee and all Past Presidents in good standing. The proposed C&BL changes empower only the seven elected directors to vote on Board business, thus removing voting privileges of Past Presidents who are not current Directors.

Fiscal Year, Elections, and Annual Meeting: VEP's fiscal year would change from April 1 – March 31 to September 1 – August 31. Board directors would be elected at May general meeting instead of the March general meeting. VEP's Annual Meeting, at which the outgoing board reports on the previous year and the incoming board is installed and board officers are announced, would change from the April general meeting to the September general meeting. These changes would provide board continuity through the busy Spring season, and provide the new Board the full summer to learn their posts and plan the upcoming program year. These changes would also simplify financial planning and reporting.

Community Service Awards: Rather than allocating separate awards for Gunderson High School, Andrew Hill High School and "At-Large", VEP would collect nominations from multiple sources, and then grant one or more awards to the best candidate(s) from the resulting pool of applicants. Nominees would be solicited from VEP members, local high schools, and/or non-

profit service organizations in our area. Each year the Board would propose for membership approval an award budget, the number of awards to grant, and any specific selection criteria.

Budget: The Board of Directors would be required to propose, and members required to approve, an Operating Budget for the coming year along with the Goals & Objectives.

Membership List: VEP mailing lists would be allowed to be distributed to trusted non-VEP personnel for the purpose of printing labels for official VEP mailings.

Funds: Banks holding VEP funds would be required to be federally insured. Checks would require one signature instead of two, but each expenditure would require an Authorization Form, which must be signed by two Directors within 30 days of the expenditure. (Authorization forms are already in use.)

Records Retention: Treasurer's records would be required to be retained for at least three years after approval of the Termination (financial) Audit for the years in which the records were created.

General Business: In order to act on *non-agendized* business matters at a general meeting, a resolution of emergency would first need to be approved by 2/3 of the members in good standing present.

Nominating Committee: The committee that nominates Board of Director candidates would be appointed by the Board *and require VEP membership approval* at the April general meeting.

Recall of Directors: Recall petitions would require signatures from at least 20 members in good standing from separate households, instead of the current 15% of total membership.

Amendments: Amendments to the Constitution will continue to require a majority vote of members present at a general membership meeting, providing the proposed amendments have first been approved by a two-thirds majority of the Board of Directors, or a majority (currently two-thirds majority) of members present at a general membership meeting.

Document clarification: The proposed new C&BL document includes a large number of miscellaneous clarifications, and much of the content has been reorganized and reformatted for clarity.

Oak Grove School District News

Welcome to the 2008-2009 school year. School started on Monday, August 25 with approximately 11,700 students ready for the first day of school. Please be especially careful driving around schools during early morning and after school dismissal.

During the summer, approximately 1,731 students attended several summer school programs. Students requiring additional help with reading and math, along with students in special education, attended classes designed to meet their needs. High achieving students benefited from special foreign language classes and advanced math instruction. The latter program was part of our partnership with the Silicon Valley Education Foundation called "Stepping Up to Algebra."

As of this writing, we still do not have a state budget. Based on the current budget assumptions, our Board of Trustees adopted a budget for the 2008-2009 school year, with \$1.5 million in reduced funding for the coming year. School districts are required to adopt a <u>balanced</u> budget by July 1 of each year.

After making the necessary program reductions, we are still offering what we consider key programs for our students: extended day kindergarten at all our schools (kindergarten students receive at least 60 minutes of additional instruction daily than required by law); small class size of 20 to 1 student-teacher ratio at grades K-3; a Visual and Performing Arts Program for students at grades 4-6; and counseling and after school sports at grades 7-8. One of the reasons we can maintain these key programs is that we were able to sell one of our closed school sites to the East Side Union High School District. We intend to deposit the proceeds from the sale and use the interest to help maintain these key programs. Furthermore, we are especially grateful to the community for the support of the \$68 parcel tax renewal in 2006. Without the parcel tax, we would not be able to maintain programs that make such a difference for our students. Thank you!

In November we are asking the community to support a \$125 million bond measure to continue to modernize our schools. These funds can only be used for facilities and not everyday operational expenses such as salaries and programs. The original bond was passed in 1995. Schools have received much needed facilities improvements, such as playgrounds, roofs, bathrooms, media centers, heating and air conditioning, and safety retrofitting. Those funds have now been expended, but much more work still needs to be done now and in the future. Many of our schools have outdated parking areas which need to be redesigned for increased traffic safety; bathrooms; roofs; and heating and air conditioning units have suffered from the normal wear and tear. Our grounds, used not only by students, but by the community at large, need significant attention, and further retrofitting of facilities to meet new seismic and fire code standards will be needed in the future. Our media centers, as well as our visual and performing arts and physical sports facilities, need to be upgraded as well. Our students deserve safe, clean schools.

Student test results <u>increased</u> in the 2007-2008 school year. Recently released results show that our District Academic Performance Index increased to $\underline{788}$ (from 772 in the prior year). We met the state's higher performance targets for the various required sub groups of students with the exception of special education.

Operation Safe Passage

With San Jose students heading back to school, it's a good time to remind drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists to slow down and pay more attention in school zones. Mayor **Chuck Reed** joined Councilmember **Pierluigi Oliverio**, Police Chief **Rob Davis**, Transportation Director **Jim Helmer**, and San Jose Unified officials at Hoover Middle School to announce Operation Safe Passage and the expansion of the School Area Parking Patrol Team.

Operation Safe Passage is a program led by the San Jose Police Department and California Highway Patrol to alert and educate the community about traffic safety. Enforcement teams will concentrate their efforts near school zones, encouraging motorists to slow down while enforcing hazardous violations. The School Area Parking Patrol Team is an effort from the Department of Transportation to increase parking compliance in school areas citywide. Providing ongoing coverage of school zones during drop-off and pick-up times, the Patrol Team will also distribute educational material on safe driving, cycling, and walking.

San Jose Unified School District News

The Board adopted District vision and mission, to inspire and prepare all students to succeed in a global economy in a safe learning environment, is defined in the accomplishments that were achieved in 2007-08 school year.

Commendation

- Lincoln High School recognized by the Ed Trust West for gains in closing the achievement gap.
- Carson Elementary School nominated as a National Blue Ribbon School.
- Pioneer High School Service Learning Program recognized as a state model.
- Broadway High School recognized as a state model continuation school.
- San Jose Unified receives the California Association for Bilingual Education (CABE) award as a model District
- Horace Mann Elementary receives architectural award.

Innovation

- San Jose High Academy establishes the first Project Lead The Way pre-engineering program in Silicon Valley, and receives a Federal Magnet Schools Assistance Grant to support this program.
- Bachrodt Academy becomes the first SJUSD conversion charter school.
- Gunderson High School receives a Federal Magnet Schools Assistance Program grant to support development of a Career Technical Strand in Information Technology.
- Allen @ Steinbeck converted to a k-8 school, Fall 08.
- San Jose Unified is the largest k-12 school district to implement the largest solar power energy efficient solar program in the nation.

Globalization

- Horace Mann Elementary, Peter Burnett Middle School, San Jose High Academy receive a Federal Magnet Grant to support the development of the International Baccalaureate Program.
- Gunderson High School receives a Federal Magnet Grant to support innovative program development in Information Technology/Media Support.
- Willow Glen Elementary and Bachrodt Academy will join Gardner Academy And River Glen k-8 as Two-Way Bilingual Immersion Schools (Spanish & English) Fall 08.

In my next article I will update you on the **Collaboration**, **Modernization**, **Career-Technical Education Plan** for our District. As I conclude this article I leave you with some highlights of our District: we were identified by the Editorial Projects in Education, a national non-profit research group as having the second highest graduation rate among the nation's 50 largest cities. In the 2008 Senior Exit Survey, with a 90% participation rate, 86% reported that they will be going to college.

Our Phase I Solar Panels have been installed at Gunderson, Pioneer, Leland and San Jose High, Phase II has begun. API growth for our district: 74% Elementary schools, 67% Middle Schools and 83% High Schools showed growth. District-wide ELA Proficiency outperformed the State by 5.6% and in Math it outperformed the State by 5.4%. Hammer, River Glen, Terrell, and Pioneer all surpassed the Target API Goal of 800.

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Fall Plantings

September is a good month for planting cool season veggies, including beets, carrots, lettuce, parsnips, certain types of peas, and Swiss chard. Broccoli, cauliflower, kohlrabi, rutabaga and turnips also do well. Leaves, stems, flower heads and roots are the edible portions of these versatile vegetables, depending on the species.



Anything grown from seed (most of the above) can usually be started in August or September. Those bought as nursery-grown seedlings are usually better transplanted in September, since the same warm weather that stimulates fast seed germination can cause tender, thirsty seedlings to wilt or burn.

Root crops, such as carrots and parsnips, require full sun, sandy or loamy soil, and regular irrigation. When sowing carrot seeds keep the soil moist and never let a crust form on top, or the seeds have difficulty sprouting (start indoors?). Unfortunately, parsnips never get as much good P.R. as their orange cousins. Parsnips' creamy white to yellow roots have a unique, mild flavor and can be baked, fried, mashed, or cooked in soups or stews. Cold weather makes them sweeter.

Another favorite is the humble beet. For absolute cut beauty and flavor, go for the Chioggia, also called Bull's Eye, an unusual Italian heirloom beet with concentric white and red rings inside. Albina Verduna is a sweet white beet that grows well here, and Sangria is a classic deep red, like the wine. Because it develops its shape early, Sangrea also makes a good "baby beet" when pulled early.

Swiss chard, a leafy vegetable, is actually a type of beet without the tasty bulbous root, and is beautiful on the dinner table served raw, steamed, or stir-fried. It's also an attention getting ornamental in the garden, when you're touring with friends. The Bright Lights variety is especially attractive, showing up with crimson, yellow and white stems.

The obvious leafy vegetable choice is lettuce, which comes in four varieties: crisphead, like iceberg and butterhead, Bibb loose leaf, Oak Leaf, and Romaine, which grows in vertical stocks.

I trust you've been pulling the heads off those dandelions all summer. If not, you should have. Every time you walk to the car to go somewhere and you see a yellow dandelion blossom, don't think, "I'll have to dig that up when I get home." It'll never happen. Prevent that plant from multiplying by going over and plucking the blossom; if it's already progressed to the fuzzy ball, all the more important to trot over and close it into your hand and throw away, before the wind spreads the spores.

San Jose Airport Update

Airport Passenger Traffic Declining as Airlines Reduce Capacity

Airport passenger traffic in June declined 6.7 percent compared to June 2007, reflecting higher airline fares, extra fees, and the softening of the economy as well as the continuing reductions in capacity by airlines throughout the nation as a result of the high cost of fuel. For Fiscal Year 2007-08, total traffic at he Airport fell 2.6 percent to 10.4 million enplaned and deplaned passengers compared to the prior year, and airline capacity at San Jose (the number of available airplane seats) declined 1.7 percent in the same period. Looking ahead, based on published schedules for November, Airport staff anticipate further cuts in airline capacity, which likely will be nearly 14 percent lower here than Last November. Projections also indicate that Oakland will lose 25 percent of capacity, SFO will lose 5 percent, and Sacramento will lose 13 percent compared to November 2007 levels.

New Terminal A "Express Checkpoint" now open at International Arrivals Building

Airport staff has worked with the Transportation Security Agency (TSA) to open a new "express security checkpoint" inside the International Arrivals Building next to Terminal A to provide better customer service. The Express Checkpoint is now open from 5:00AM to 11:00AM daily for passengers on Southwest, American, Hawaiian, and Mexicana Airlines who have already printed their boarding passes and do not have bags to check. The new checkpoint helps reduce security waiting times at Terminal A and is serving more than 500 passengers every morning. For more information contact **Bob Swensen** at 277-5347.

The new Pearl Avenue Library is now open By Dave Fadness

A gala grand opening ceremony was held on August 9 for our new Pearl Avenue Branch Library. Hundreds of eager patrons crowded in—and were not disappointed. It's simply beautiful!

This attractive new 14,000 square foot facility is twice bigger than the heavily used, but cramped and out-dated library it replaces. The old library was built in 1971 on the same site.



The new, feature-rich Pearl now has a storytelling area, a children's collection, a community meeting room, a teen room, a group study room, a quiet study room, a tech center (with 24 public computers), an Internet Cafe, a community living room, and an adult collection. The entire collection of library materials is brand new.



Library patrons enter directly into what's called the Market Place, where new books and multi-media collections are displayed as they might be at your favorite local book store. Floating canopies beckon entering patrons to an Internet Cafe. Bamboo trellises form a gateway from the Market Place into the children's area under a garden canopy of leaves, flowers, vines, and playful bug-shaped lights. A soaring roof line leads the user through the adult collection to the Living Room, an area that features comfortable seating, newspapers, magazines and periodicals, a fireplace, and a pleasant view of an outdoor garden.

Be sure to visit Pearl to see it for your self. You will be very impressed!

The new Pearl was built using money from a voter-approved bond. Those bond funds cannot be used for furnishings, collec-

tions, and the other amenities that make an empty building into a functioning library. To supplement available city funds in order to buy those things, the non-profit *San Jose Public Library Foundation* turned to donations from citizens and local businesses.



At a special preview reception on August 7, more than 300 donors attended to see the fruits of their generosity. As of that day, \$245,000 had been raised—and more donations are still arriving, as those who visit Pearl become inspired to lend their support.

You can still get your name, your family name, or your business name on Pearl's *Community Donor Wall*; all it takes is a donation of \$100 or more. Gifts of \$1000 to \$4999 are recognized on a *Legacy Donor Wall*; over \$5000 gets *Laureate Donor Wall* listing.

Your tax-deductible donation will be used first to complete the new facility and then for equipment and library materials as they become needed in coming years..

The **San Jose Elections Commission** monitors compliance with all campaign and ethics ordinance in the San Jose Municipal Code. The commission reviews and investigate allegations of violations of the code and makes recommendations for enforcement action when appropriate. The Election Commission also makes recommendations to the council with regard to campaign and ethics regulations and policies.

The Civil Service Commission makes recommendations to the City Council and the City Manager and conducts investigations concerning the administration of personnel in the Classified Service. The commission acts as an administrative hearing body for appeals of personnel decisions affecting city employees and applicants. 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VTA Light Rail Platform Retrofit Project

Platform retrofit work at the Branham, Capitol Curtner, Ohlone/Chynoweth, Oakridge and Almaden light rail stations was completed over the summer by the Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA).



VTA is currently retrofitting the Cottle and Blossom Hill light rail stations, and these should reopen by September 27th. Once these stations, plus Snell and Santa Teresa are finished by year's end, every station in VTA's 42-mile light rail system will feature level boarding.

If you are a regular light rail rider, please take a minute to appreciate the long term benefits of this project by watching people board and exit light rail trains at an already retrofitted station. With the vehicle floor level with the station platform, individuals using mobility devices clearly have a much easier time boarding and exiting. As you watch, you'll notice other people also benefit from the level boarding, including cyclists who can roll their bike right on, parents with strollers, travelers with luggage, students with rolling book bags and seniors with folding utility carts.
