November General Meeting Synopsis

With the holiday season fast approaching, VEP members gathered at the Vista Park Community Room on Tuesday November 25th for our last general meeting of 2008.

Our first guest was **Nancy Pyle**, who presented a 5-year action plan for her second term of office beginning in January 2009. Her top priorities are: sustainability, youth, international reputation, sustainable green vision, and emergency preparation. See your November 2008 VEP News for more detail on these items.

Nancy is seeking feedback on her 5-year action plan and requesting comments be received by March 2009.

Nancy reported that ten new stores were opened at Oakridge Mall thanks to community input.

Considering the ongoing city budget challenge, Nancy asked:

What services should the city deliver?
What services can the city help facilitate?
What services that the city currently provides should be left to the residents?

Nancy announced that an emergency preparation kickoff event will be held the last Saturday in April at Pioneer High School. VEP member **Helen Castillo** is serving on the District 10 emergency preparedness committee, and she hopes to lead a pilot program in the VEP area.

Nancy's top five priorities for the VEP area are: Vista Park Community Room site improvements, VTA developments & traffic problems in the Capitol Expy / Narvaez Ave. area, Branham Lane improvements, Martial Cottle Park development, and sports fields (in partnership with San Jose Unified School District)

Following Nancy's presentation, we covered VEP business and announcements.

November General Meeting Synopsis (con't)

Dave Noel presented proposed updates to two sections of the VEP Constitution and Bylaws: Funds and Community Service Awards. VEP members approved changes to the rest of the C&BL at the September meeting, but requested these sections go back to committee for further refinement. The revised proposals for these two sections were approved unanimously.

Adina Pierce presented a brief Martial Cottle Park master plan update (see article in this issue).

Helen Castillo, **Susan Iverson** and **Adina Pierce** announced that **Santa** would visit VEP on Sunday November 30th, at our first ever **Santa at the Park** event.

Katherine Decker announced the Blossom Valley Christmas Tree lighting would follow the *Santa at the Park* event on November 30th at 6 pm.

VEP Board of Directors Appoints New Board Members

At the January 5th Board of Directors meeting, two new board members were appointed to fill open positions. New board members are **Debra Suydam** and **Helen Castillo**. Debra is a long time VEP volunteer. She has previously served as both the Hospitality Coordinator and the Volunteer Coordinator. Debra currently coordinates VEP's participation in the annual San Jose Daffodil planting, as well as assisting with the monthly VEP newsletter mailing preparation. She has her own business which develops and designs laboratories. Helen Castillo is currently the VEP Volunteer Coordinator and is enthusiastically working to develop a structured system for volunteers. Helen is a real estate agent with Ventura Barnett Properties.

These two new board positions were the result of a change in the VEP Constitution and Bylaws approved by the membership at the September general meeting. This revision expanded the Board of Directors to a seven members, and provided the Board authority to make appointments to fill open positions. Regularly scheduled elections will take place at the May general membership meeting.

Community Service Awards

Since 1975, VEP has been rewarding graduating high school seniors for their exceptional volunteer service with stipends for post-secondary or vocational training. It's hard to believe the 2008-2009 school year is already half over, and it's time to launch our 2009 Community Service Awards.

Members present at our January 27th general meeting will be asked to vote on the 2009 CSA proposal outlined below.

The 2009 CSA program budget was set to \$2000 when members approved on VEP's 2008-2009 annual budget at the September general meeting.

VEP Constitution and By-Laws changes approved by members at the November 25th general meeting changed two fundamental rules that govern the CSA program:

First, we may now pool all applications received from our three sources (Andrew Hill High School, Gunderson High School,

and At-Large), and then grant awards to the top "n" candidates, where "n" is the number of awards specified in the annual proposal.

Second, the eligibility of At-Large candidates has been reduced to students who live in the VEP area, or who are children of VEP members and live in San Jose. Previously At-Large eligibility was defined as a student who lives in San Jose and has been nominated by a VEP member.

As committee chair, I recommend the following proposal for our 2009 CSAs:

- Solicit a minimum of two candidates each from Andrew Hill and Gunderson High Schools via designated school administrators. Solicit At-Large candidates via publication in the VEP News and VEP emails.
 - 2. VEP's CSA judges will select one winner from each category (Andrew Hill, Gunderson, and At-Large) that has at least one candidate the judges deem worthy of an award. The applicants' names will not be disclosed to the judges. The judges' decisions will be final.
 - 3. If three awards are granted, each will be \$650. If one or two awards are granted, each will be \$1000. If the full amount of this year's appropriation is not awarded, the remaining amount will be returned to VEP's treasury.

Nominations will be solicited in February and March. Applications will be due in late April, and we'll grant our award(s) in late May/early June.

If you know a high school senior with an outstanding volunteer record, please make sure he or she knows about our award.

VEP Constitution and By-Laws Update

Our City Forest needs Y-O-U-R Help Now

Our City Forest (OCF) is the non-profit organization we and other volunteer organizations work with in our community tree planting projects. Their purpose is to provide trees, at no cost, for planting in public places like parks, streets, school yards, etc. Individual homeowners can request street trees, as well. OCF also assists in planting



In recent years, OCF has donated 267 trees to VEP--and have always sent volunteers to help us plant them. They've never charged us or asked us for one cent.

OCF is funded by individual donations and by a variety of public and private grants. Last year they had their funding cut by the City of San Jose. This year, they're being hit hard by the state budget crisis. As a result, they now desperately need your help.

The following open letter from OCF's Director **Rhonda Berry** is addressed to us. Please respond generously so their program can continue successfully. We need them.

Hello Friends.

You've probably heard of Our City Forest – the local nonprofit that has been the saving grace for San Jose's urban forest. Many of you may have even received one of the 47,000 free shade trees we have planted throughout hundreds of San Jose neighborhoods. In addition, your children most likely attend or previously attended



schools or parks where OCF is planting and conducting environmental activities and classes.

There is probably no place in San Jose that hasn't been impacted by this "lean and green" nonprofit. Our air is cleaner, our water purer, our traffic calmer, our views more beautiful, our breathing easier, our summer days cooler, and our quality of life greatly improved thanks to OCF.

Unfortunately, OCF was informed last week that due to the state budget crisis, its state tree planting, tree care and education grant awards have all been frozen. OCF has also been instructed to "stop all work" on these grants unless there is other revenue to support its activities. Even reimbursements from the state for completed work have been suspended, creating a true financial crisis for us.

The City of San Jose has a "Green Vision", and we need a valuable resource like Our City Forest to help achieve that vision. The trees in our city are our "urban forest," the most valuable urban natural resource we have. OCF has been the leader since 1994 in not only bringing attention to the plight of our urban forest but also doing something about it with bold community-based initiatives.

OCF has motivated more than 100,000 residents to come outside and help plant trees! If OCF wasn't out there bringing in the funding for the trees, stakes, arborists, mulch, cement-cutting, trucks, planting coordinators, insurance tools, etc., we wouldn't have anything to help plant!

Your support is needed more than ever to help this wonderful nonprofit continue serving our community. With your support, OCF can continue to grow a healthier city and improve the quality of life in our neighborhoods, schools, and workplaces.

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It's Bare Root Tree Time

Most nurseries are fully stocked with bare root trees and roses now. If you are looking for unusual fruit trees to add to your garden, new this year is Cot-N-Candy, an early season, self-fruiting aprium (apricot and plum cross) that offers extra sweet, juicy 2-3-inch fruit. Flavo-



rosa is a variety of pluot (plum and apricot cross) that produces very sweet, medium-size fruit with dark purple skin and red flesh. It ripens toward the end of May.

You can also plant a whole orchard with one tree called the Fruit Salad tree. It is a combination of peach, nectarine, plum and apricot all on the same tree.

California Dreamin' is a hybrid tea (long stemmed) rose with beautiful white flowers tinged in pink. It provides a strong citrus fragrance, is disease resistant, and grows well here. Pink Promise, another hybrid tea, not only offers a perfectly formed large pink bloom, it also is the official rose of the National Cancer Foundation (a portion of each sale goes to the foundation).

Once you bring your plant home, make sure to keep it moist. It's a good idea to soak the plant for several hours before planting. Inspect the plant's roots; healthy plants will be symmetrical around the trunk. If roots are knotted, broken or appear diseased, the plant should be discarded, or if possible, returned and exchanged.

Dig a hole at least as wide as the roots and amend the soil with organic material (compost or mulch) that equals one-third to one-half of the amount of soil removed and mix thoroughly. Mound the soil in the middle of the hole and place roots over the mound, backfill with amended soil, and as you fill the hole use your hands to firmly tamp down the soil to remove air pockets. Make a water basin slightly wider than the root system, and fill with water.

Keep you new plant moist for the first couple of weeks. Once established, deep water once or twice a week should be sufficient. In six to eight weeks add a layer of mulch to conserve moisture and keep the weeds away.

DO <u>NOT</u> **TOP TREES:** Topping trees is very harmful to proper tree growth and appearance. When a tree is topped, it is shocked into producing fast growth to the sides of the topped branches. The new growth will look very unnatural as it matures over time, and will also be weaker than normal growth. For full details, see your April 2006 VEP News (available at www.vepca.net).

Rose Pruning Time

It's Tough-Love time for roses; that means stripping leaves, taking shears to lanky canes, and ripping out suckers. This isn't brain surgery; anybody can do it and should. You don't have to thin out the center of the plant, but you should clip an interior cane that crosses another. And do remove the leaves, so the rose will think it's going dormant. Cut above the node, where the a new shoot will grow. And if you make a mistake, don't sweat it; roses are pretty good at handling themselves. and feed them compost if you have some. If you're interested in some easy lessons, and tips from the masters, you can get three hours of instruction and practice at San Jose's Heritage Rose Garden at Spring and Taylor (or Coleman and Taylor) from 9 a.m. to noon every Wednesday and Friday. 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Martial Cottle Update

Things are moving along quickly in the planning phase of Martial Cottle Park. After the October 23, 2008 public workshop, VEP submitted a document outlining concerns we had about their three alternatives. The main points are:

We do not support an entrance on Branham Lane
We would like the proposed buffer zone between the
homes along the western edge of the park increased

At the December 10 Task Force meeting, the county presented another alternative. The main changes were the absence of a dog park, and lake. It was determined that a dog park does not fit within the guidelines of the deed restrictions for the park. Instead of a lake, they are proposing a wetland area.

At the meeting, Marilyn Rogers and Mike Bousman spoke about VEP's disapproval of the Branham Lane entrance. Because of this, the design alternative is being re-worked, and will be presented at the next meeting in February (the meetings originally planned January were rescheduled) .

Adina Pierce and Charlie Friedericks also spoke to the planning team before the meeting, expressing our concerns about the proposed 30 foot buffer zone. We feel this is not enough, based on privacy and security concerns.

Oak Grove School District

(Parkview Elementary School) By Manny Barbara, Superintendent

As of this writing, the state budget remains unsettled. School districts are expecting a reduction of \$300 per student retroactive to July 1, 2008. This



translates to a \$3 million reduction to our District on top of the \$5 million already cut over the last several years. We have been able to sustain some of our key programs, such as class size reduction at grades K-3, only because we have already closed schools and have enjoyed the support of the greater community with the renewal of the Parcel Tax in 2006. One proposal from the Governor would reduce the student instructional year from 180 to 175 days. All of us in public education are anxiously awaiting the impact of the final budget, once it is signed by the Governor.

And after 36 years serving in the Oak Grove School District, I will be retiring at the end of this school year. I started in 1973 as a school psychologist and served in various capacities at all three intermediate schools (Bernal, Davis, and Herman) and as a principal at Baldwin, Oak Ridge, and Davis Schools. It has been my honor and privilege to serve as Superintendent for the past 10 years. Oak Grove has been like a second family to me over the years, and I have been fortunate to work with so many outstanding staff, parents, students and community members in my various roles. Thank you. Our Board of Trustees will begin the process of selecting a new superintendent and is in the process of soliciting input from the community. There are two open Community Forums being held by Leadership Associates, the search firm hired by our Board of Trustees. The first will be on Wednesday, January 21 at 6:00 p.m., at the Oak Grove School District Office, 6578 Santa Teresa Boulevard. The second will be held on Thursday, January 22 at 8:15 a.m., at Christopher Elementary School Library, 565 Coyote Road. You may also attend the public Board Meetings on Thursday, January 22 and Thursday, February 12, starting at 7:30 p.m., at the District Office.

Gunderson High School Happenings

I am pleased to share with our community some of the exciting events that are happening at Gunderson High School over the next few weeks.



As the first semester of the school year has drawn to a close, we are gearing up for the recruitment period

for incoming 8th graders. Information about Gunderson has been sent out to all 8th grade families who live in our enrollment area. We are inviting them to attend tours of the campus, shadow days and/or parent information sessions. We have been fortunate in that we have seen a steady increase in our enrollment over the past few years, and hope this trend continues.

The issue that has taken up a lot of our time and has caused a fair amount of stress to schools and educators is the current state of the budget. As our elected politicians continue to try and decide what is right and fair for California, our schools and children feel the brunt of their indecision. As a result of the current budget crisis, SJUSD has instituted a mandatory spending freeze. Fortunately, many of us saw this move on the horizon and spent money on materials and supplies early in the year for later use. This means that neither teachers nor students should feel any ill effects - there a re plenty of supplies; all students have textbooks and access to necessary technology; and the school is in a good state of repair. In addition, since the construction projects are funded from bond money, this work has continued and will be completed. The 2009/2010 school year will definitely feel more of an impact though. As we learn more about these specifics, we will keep our families and communities informed. Thank you for your support as we chart these unknown and tumultuous waters.

Finally, a pleasant reminder to our neighbors... The Gunderson property does not house a dog park. Many of our athletes and coaches (especially those who play soccer) have noticed an increased amount of waste on the fields. Dogs, leashed or unleashed, are not allowed on the facility. If you decide to bring your dog on campus irregardless of this rule, please be courteous enough to clean up after Fido. The students appreciate it!



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San Jose Unified School District

I am sure all of you have been hearing about our State Budget Crisis; here are some thoughts and comments regarding the Governor's latest proposal. Recently our Superintendent, Don



Iglesias mentioned this quote "There is an old saying, how we treat the most vulnerable in our society is a sign of who we are as a people. Clearly our children are the most vulnerable. They can't vote, they don't have lobbyists, they aren't eligible for a bailout, and they are easy pickings for politicians. They just have us, the educators who care about them and their future, and the legislatures who realize and understand the impact of these devastating cuts".

Mr. Iglesias also provided the following information about our District: San Jose Unified has made great gains in student literacy levels and graduation rates, (second in the nation), narrowed the achievement gap by 20%, high school graduates twice as likely to go to college. All this progress is at risk with the recent budget proposal currently being discussed by our Governor and legislators. Public schools educate 90% of the children in California...your children, your grandchildren, your brothers and sisters, nieces and nephews. In spite of California being close to last in the nation among states in per pupil spending, they have already taken a \$3 Billion hit this year. In the last couple of years in SJUSD, we have cut librarians, increased class size, reduced teaching staff, support and administrative staffs. We have closed schools, closed programs and reduced budgets. The level of cuts being proposed for 2009-10 are catastrophic and threaten to erase all of the improvement we have made". What the Governor's proposal means to SJUSD: 2008-09, \$10 million cut (mid year cut of 5%) \$275 per student. 2009-10: \$10 million cut 5% ongoing (\$275) Additional \$ 6 million cut (3%) (\$190). Our reserves cannot sustain this level of cut in revenue. We will have to cut programs, and look at furlough days and consider a reduction in the length of the school year. We are making every effort to provide our local legislators with the devastating affects to our school district. Although we can hope for the best but in reality, we must prepare for the worst.

San Jose Named "Most Secure" Big City

San Jose was ranked first among large metropolitan areas for "Most Secure U.S. Places to Live," according to research conducted by Farmers Insurance Group .

The rankings used several variables including crime statistic, extreme weather, risk of natural disasters, environmental hazards, terrorism threats, air quality, life expectancy, and job loss numbers. The study divided 379 U.S. municipalities into three groups: large metropolitan areas, mid-size cities, and small towns. The study ranked Corvallis, Oregon and Olympia, Washington first among small towns and mid-size cities respectively.

Less is more

It's called the big box syndrome. We buy more stuff at big-box retailers. We drive bigger cars to haul all that stuff home. We have bigger homes to put everything in. Yet somehow we still don't seem to have enough room for everything.

Here are some specifics: In the 1950's, the average woman in the U.S. had four pairs of shoes. Today, it's thirteen pairs (and many more for a lot of women). In 1970, the average size of a home was 1,400 square feet. Today, it's 2,340 square-feet. So, if more space and more clutter go hand in hand, even-with that additional space, how can you get clutter under control?

Here are some ideas about how to simplify, pare down, and focus on what's really important...

~Pretend that you are moving~

It's time to pare down. If you had to move, would you take it with you? Do you really need three hair dryers? Or what about all of those books; do you really need to keep all of them? Donate what you don't need.

~Keep only what you love~

~The benefits of less~

Less stuff equals more time. With less stuff, there's less to clean, organize, and dust. With less stuff, your house looks uncluttered and cleaner. Let this fact motivate you.

~Learn to love containers~

Containers instantly add order to chaos and are the secret weapon of organizers everywhere. Put all the kids' shoes in a tub, the newspapers in a bucket, fingernail polish in a basket, and so on.

~Everything in its place~

Yes, this is something your mother always said--and she was right. When everything has a place on a shelf, in a cabinet, or in a bin, you'll avoid counter clutter and junk-filled drawers.

~Remember the two-year rule~

If you haven't used something for two years, chances are you won't use it again. This particularly applies to clothes. Get rid of

~Don't get buried under sentimentality~

Sure, it's nice to keep possessions you cherish, but do you really *need* your high school prom dress? If you are keeping your wedding dress, have it professionally boxed at a dry cleaners and put it in storage. What about your children's collection of stuffed animals? Keep one to pass on to the next generation, then donate the rest.

~One in, one out~

This rule is pivotal to maintaining the simple, clutter-free existence you've worked so hard to achieve: If something new comes into your house, something old has to go out.

~Maximize your storage~

There are all sorts of helpful items these days that help you make the most of small spaces. Ottomans with removable tops are the perfect place to store toys, board games, or extra bedding. And under-bed baskets are great for storing large or awkward items.

~Organize by bits~

It's going to take awhile to go through your entire house--after all, it may have taken you up to twenty years to acquire all of your current clutter. So be easy on yourself and try not to attempt too much in one sitting. Start with one closet and give yourself a six-hour limit.

~Controlling the paper chase~

If stacks of paper are overwhelming your kitchen counters, desktop, and tabletops, here are a few quick ways to get them under control:

Have your recycle bin ready. When you bring in the mail, toss out the junk mail right away.

Read and route. When paperwork enters the house, read it and route it to the other appropriate family members.

Create in-baskets for everyone. Every family member gets one for signed permission slips, phone messages, bills, etc.

Keep a communal calendar. Post everyone's schedule on one calendar, and keep all schedules and invites in a binder for backup.

Take bill paying online. You can receive and pay your bills on the Internet for a happy, paperless existence.

~Secret weapons~

Here are the essential tools that help you contain clutter:

Over-the-door vinyl shoe organizers. These aren't just for shoes anymore. Install one on the closet door in your child's room for an easy place to put small toys.

Small stacking bins with drawers. Use a few of these in a cabinet—one for first aid, one for kids' medicine. You can pull out the entire drawer for easy access.

Sliding shelf baskets. You can buy these in a variety of home improvement stores. Install one in the pantry and you'll be able to pull out everything on the shelf. No more finding four-year old cans of soup way in the back behind stacks of pasta boxes!

Sub shelves. These help you create a shelf within a shelf and are especially handy for tall cabinets with few shelves. For example, install the extra shelf, put plates on the bottom shelf and then place mugs or glasses on top of the sub-shelf unit.

~Straighten up your house~

Once you've organized your house, keeping it that way is easier.

Do one room at a time. Attack one room at a time, even if it's one room a day (or one room a week).

No zigzagging. Have a plan to start at one end of the room and methodically work your way across.

Go for instant gratification. Do the things that make the biggest difference first. Make the bed. Recycle the stack of newspapers. Put away the laundry.

Get it out. If something belongs in another room, put it there.

Baby steps. Avoid going from one floor of your home to another without returning an item to where it belongs. Keep a basket next to the stairs to collect items that need to be put away, and grab one each time you go by.

~What to do with un-needed stuff~

- 1. Donate to charity. Try charityguide.org or justgive.org or goodwill.org.
- 2. Give it away. Post your unwanted items on Freecycle.org (a San Jose group) or freemesa.org.
- 3. Sell it online. Try ebay.com or craigslist.com.
- 4. Set it aside (but don't wait) until VEP's annual Communitywide Garage sale in May. You'll probably be able to unload many of those unused treasures for cash, then conveniently donate the rest on the same day. Watch your VEP NEWS for the date.

At the California Clean Tech Open's third annual awards gala, Mayor Reed presented the winners and runners up with the inaugural San Jose Prize for Green Vision Innovation. A total of 13 start-up companies received a prize that includes a year of furnished office space at the Environmental Business Cluster as well as donated services from a number of private sector companies. The Prize for Green Vision Innovation attracts emerging companies to San Jose to grow and create Clean Tech jobs within the City.

Borgata Recycling has opened a 19,000-square-foot manufacturing and warehouse facility in San Jose. The new recycling center will convert used tires into construction materials, creating an environmentally-friendly and cost effective solution. The company is also in the process of developing technology to turn the tires into diesel fuel.

Mayor Reed joined San Francisco Mayor Gavin Newsom and Oakland **Mayor Ron Dellums** to announce a regional partnership to transform the Bay Area into the Electric Vehicle Capital of the United States. Working with the global electric transportation company, Better Place, the region will work to expedite permitting and installation of charging outlets and create a regional standard for Electric Vehicle infrastructure Regulation

San Jose City Parkstrip Tree Rules

Here's quick reference to the rules regarding street trees:

PERMITS:

You need a permit to plant or trim a street tree

The permit is free

A permit is not required if you use a pre-approved tree service (see website)

VERTICAL CLEARANCES:

8 feet from sidewalk to canopy 13 feet from street to canopy

PLANTING CLEARANCES:

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Gone Phishing

Phishing is the term used to describe sneaky ways crooks try to get you to reveal personal information via the internet or phone so that they can access your bank account and so on. A few recent scams involve persons pretending to be from the IRS (bogus tax refund), Social Security Administration (bogus cost of living increase), or the local courthouse (bogus jury duty).

Just remember a simple rule: never give out your personal information to someone who contacts you. Only give your information to people you contact and trust.

Never use hyperlinks in emails you receive to access bank accounts, ebay accounts, and so on. Instead, open a new browser window, then go to the institution's official website, or call the institution by phone.

Don't keep your social security card in your wallet, and be very wary of giving your social security number to anyone.

How many of you have fallen for this one: Click here to view an e-card from a friend... now enter your email address and password. Guess what, no e-card. But pretty soon someone might use your email account to send spam, so be sure to change your password immediately if you get fooled into revealing it to a "phisherman".


