Neighborhood Safety Alert

Several neighbors have alerted VEP to some recent incidents which need to be highlighted for everyone's attention. Two strong arm robberies have occurred during the end of March and first week in April. The first was on March 25th at the corner of Branham and Vista Park. The



second occurred on April 6^{th} at 10pm on Indigo Drive. This victim of this incident was a woman who had just pulled up in her driveway, was approached by two men while she was still in her car. She was threatened and robbed. Fortunately, she was not hurt.

A VEP member also reported several attempted home breakins in and around the Devon Park Court area. Four young men were observed on a weekday morning at approximately 10:30am going from house to house, trying each house door knob. This incident occurred during the last week in March. The police were contacted.

The police are advising residents to increase their vigilance as home break-ins and robberies are on the increase. They suggest that residents lock side garage doors and place locks on side gates, as this appears to be the primary access to home break-ins. Any suspicious behavior should be immediately reported to the police.

Oak Grove School District

Grove are preparing to take
the state assessments to
evaluate all of the hard work
that has gone on since the
start of the school year. I am



confident that we will do well and meet our targets.

Oak Grove believes in offering parents options in programs for their children. We continue to offer the following programs: a Junior Kindergarten for those with birthdays August 1 through December 2, a Kindergarten through third grade Bilingual waiver program, the Independent Study Program, INDIGO, a parent participatory program based on a constructivist/positive discipline approach to learning, and small school programs within our intermediate schools.

The 2010-11 school year will see the implementation of a STEMS choice program for students in grades 5-8. This choice program will focus on a hands-on approach to learning focusing on science, technology, math and science. Parents interested in signing up for this program, which will be housed at Herman Intermediate School, may obtain a choice application form at any our of schools or our District Office.

Thanks to our community, Oak Grove receives approximately \$1.7 million a year from the current parcel tax. This tax of \$68 per year, per parcel (seniors and renters are exempt from this tax) will expire in June. Oak Grove will ask our community to renew the \$68 during the June election. Measure C is the ballot measure and it is the second lowest parcel tax in our county for school districts.

What is Neighborhood Watch?

Neighborhood Watch focuses on informing the community how to discourage, deter and prevent crimes such as burglary, auto theft, car break-ins, and personal crimes which often occur in or near homes. Issues such as vandalism, graffiti, drug dealing and gang



activity, sex offenders are also addressed when applicable.

DID YOU KNOW...?

- That most residential burglaries occur during DAYLIGHT HOURS?
- How burglars can tell at a glance which homes are EASY TAR-
- What to do if you see a suspicious person on YOUR STREET?
- What types of personal attacks can happen to you right in YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD?
- Why personal property which has been engraved with a California driver's license number is LESS LIKELY to be stolen?
- That crime rates in NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH communities can be greatly reduced through the simple, common sense measures you can learn by attending a NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH meeting.

VEP's hope and goal has been to have a large number of Neighborhood Watch groups. The Board of Directors is facilitating a process to publish the active Neighborhood Watch Groups within our VEP vicinity, which will allow households located within a street or small geographic area to be part of that specific Neighborhood Watch or to organize their own. It will also serve to allow block captains to contact each other to hear about issues, communications and resolution within other groups.

Mossy Bricks and Squirrels

Brick patios that get very little sun in the winter end up with a healthy moss growth by this time of year. Moss can be removed with Lilly-Millers Moss Out. It's available at Woolworth's and Orchard's. Be careful to keep the solution away from flowers and plants, however. Next year consider putting it on before the rains start as a preventive measure.

Squirrels

As you know from previous newsletters, there are no repellents or magic wands to make squirrels go away. But you can discourage them by putting walnut-size rocks on the surface of soil in pots and planters. Use colored rocks if possible -- red, white, lava or smooth black stones. Don't ask me why it works, but the size is important, but those bushy-tailed rats will leave your

containers alone

Crab grass Bothering You?

One way to handle crab grass is weed killers. Many types exist. The most effective among them are pre-emergent types that kill weed seeds as they sprout. It's essential to apply the herbicide before the crabgrass emerges from the soil. This happens in spring when soil temperatures are greater than 55; to 60;F for 7 to 10 consecutive days, so you may still have time. Check with your local extension service for timing, or monitor the soil temperature yourself us-



ing a soil thermometer inserted at an angle just below the surface. But don't apply weed killers prior to seeding or in an area that's just been seeded.

5 Pointers for Container Gardening

- Don't wait for plants to "grow into" the pot; pack them in, then prune or remove later.
- 2. Water them in the morning, so leaves aren't wet at night. Check the soil often, water accordingly
- 3. Let that water drain. Make sure the pot has drainage holes, and us a drainage-friendly potting soil, not dirt from the backyard.
- 4. Mix a granular, slow-release fertilizer with the potting sil before you plant. Use a water-soluble, half-strength fertilizer when plants are actively growing.
- 5. Deadheading once a week will help plants bloom and fill
