Ms. Jones briefly reviewed the process for notification/ calling in incidents of graffiti, as well as the additional steps to follow (this information was previously highlighted in the October edition of the VEP Newsletter):

Lori Ortiz provided a review of the contents of the Anti-Graffiti Kit. For additional information, and to sign up as an Anti-Graffiti volunteer, call 408/277-3208.

Featured guest speaker was **Frank McLaughlin**. Mr. McLaughlin, a former police officer with both the Chicago Police Department and the Morgan Hill Police Department, is currently on staff with Councilmember Nancy Pyle's office. Rather than a formal presentation, he asked the audience for questions on their concerns. Mr. McLaughlin provided many tips – which fell into three categories – house and yard lighting, other home security suggestions, and suggestions to improve personal security. Extensive research has been done in the area of house and yard lighting. Frank provided a handout of highlights from CPTED – Crime Prevention through Environmental Design Overview. These are strategies intended to reduce crime, the fear of crime, and the opportunities to commit crimes. It attempts to deter criminal behavior through environmental design. Some of the tips included in his handout:

- Make your home looked occupied inside lighting inside the home
- Landscape lighting and yard lighting the more the better (as long as it is not shining into your neighbor's home/ yard)
- Be sure to prune back bushes and trees so that your yard is easily visible

Motion sensor lights are very helpful

Other house security suggestions:

Put locks on side gates; keep garage side doors locked to prevent easy access into garage and/or home

Invest in a good quality interior alarm system

A motion sensor light with security camera attached may be helpful for specific concerns Personal safety:

- Be aware of your surroundings major distractions include cell phones and texting
- Use whistles to attract attention; have pepper spray easily accessible
- Have 911 and San Jose's local dispatch number 277-8911 programmed into your cell phone for ease of use in an emergency
- If concerned about someone watching/following you, get to area with lots of people, and call police

Always lock your car

Holidays are close at hand – don't put valuables/gifts in your car – easily visible. Thieves will break car windows to access. Put purse and/or packages in trunk.....and then..., move your car to another parking <u>space</u> (in case someone is watching you). Always, lock your car!

The October meeting utilized a Halloween theme for decorations and treats. Katherine Decker, Board Member and Welcoming Committee Chair surprised everyone by eloquently dressing as a well-disguised "witch". Board Members, Debra Suydam and Helen Castillo followed the theme, also wearing "witches" hats. Board Member Arul Edwin was a very convincing CalTrans Worker.

Street Lights Needing Repair

With Fall - daylight hours become shorter, and everyone becomes more aware of dark streets in our neighborhoods. Recently, several street lights were dark on Vistapark Drive, south of Branham Lane. In fact, over the period of approximately three months, 7 lights in a row went out, enveloping this area in darkness. The pole light numbers and addresses were called into the city's Street Light Repair number at 277-5517. In the past, the goal of city staff was to repair street lights in 7 – 14 days of notification. Many city services have been necessarily reduced as a result of budget deficits.



One such reduced service is repair of street lights. Currently, the timeline for repairs has been extended to several weeks. Staff will, however, repair street lights on a first come - first serve basis – thus, increasing the importance of residents reporting street light outages as soon as possible. <u>Remember, adequate lighting discourages criminal activity!</u>

An additional issue of concern (which also results in service delay) is the cost and availability of materials – specifically copper wiring (which is used in the repair of street lights). Copper is in high demand, and short supply – making it expensive and attractive to thieves. Whenever several street lights in a row go dark, possible theft of copper wiring is suspected. Should residents notice unmarked vehicles and/or workers without identifying city worker uniforms working on or around street light poles, contact the police department.

For <u>Streetlights Needing Repair</u> – call 277-5517. The information required includes the pole number, the street address and/or location, and your name and phone number. <u>Help keep our neighborhood safe!</u>

City of San Jose's "Bring Your Own Bag" Ordinance—Begins on January 1, 2012

All grocery and retail stores in San Jose can no longer provide single-use carryout plastic bags at checkout. Consumers will have the option to bring their own reusable bags or to purchase recycled content paper bags.




Important Information About the New Ordinance:

- Stores may sell paper bags made of a least 40 percent post-consumer recycled content for a minimum 10 cents for each bag. The minimum price will increase to 25 cents after two years on January 1, 2014. Stores retain all of the proceeds from the sale of recycled paper bags.
- Protective plastic or paper bags without handles are allowed for items such as meat, fresh produce, bulk food, and prescription medication, and for items that could damage or contaminate other food or merchandise when placed together in a reusable bag or paper bag at checkout.
- Qualifying WIC and CalFresh "food stamp" purchases can be exempt from the cost of recycled paper bags at checkout through December 31, 2013.

Shopping with Reusable Bags is the Best Choice

Plastic bags are one of the most common litter items found in creek cleanups. A high quality reusable bag has the potential to replace over 600 single-use plastic bags over its lifetime. Shopping with reusable bags is a great way to take part in reducing litter and conserving natural resources.

U.S. Capitol Christmas Tree

There is a little more than the usual excitement surrounding the Capitol Christmas tree this year. First, congratulations to the State of California. California was the state selected to provide the Capitol Christmas Tree, a 60-foot Sierra white fir from Stanislaus National Forest (outside of Sonora). There is also a San Jose connection. A retired profes-



sional truck driver, Duane Brusseau, a resident of San Jose, will be driving the truck that will haul the tree from Sonora, across country to Washington, D.C. and the front lawn of the U.S. Capitol. The tree weighs 8,300 pounds and will require 60 gallons of water per day to keep it fresh. The tree's entourage will make several stops at small towns and cities along the way, beginning with communities in the Central Valley of California, travelling along Hwy 99 to Southern California before turning east. The convoy will collect and deliver 5,000 handmade ornaments from children and adults in California to be placed on the tree in time for the lighting ceremony on December 6th. The Forest Service is also providing an online tracking system this year that allows people to track the tree. Home Sales

Pending home sales in California fell in September, as is typical for this time of year, but were up from the previous year for the fifth consecutive month. Additionally, distressed home sales increased slightly in September from both the previous month and year.

Pending home sales:

California pending home sales fell 5.2 percent in September, but were up from a year ago, according to C.A.R.'s Pending Home Sales Index (PHSI)*. The index was 118.5 in September, based on contracts signed in that month, down from August's index of 125.0. The index was up 8.4 percent from September 2010. September marked the fifth consecutive month that pending sales rose from the previous year. Pending home sales are forward-looking indicators of future home sales activity, providing information on the future direction of the market.

"While recent pending home sales have increased from last year's levels, housing inventory remains lean across all property types, particularly REOs (real estate-owned), which currently is at a 2.6-month supply. However, some major lenders recently announced they would accelerate the release of RE-Os onto the market, which should help alleviate the current shortage of housing inventory. With the inventory being down we are still seeing multiple offers on homes listed on the market that are priced correctly.

Our Parks Need Help By Ginger Cardona

Over the years each of our five local neighborhood parks has been a source of pride for our VEP Community. Even before

the City of San Jose reduced services to our parks, our local community reached out to each of our community parks and were adopted by local residents.

We are currently in need of new volunteers to adopt the parks. With the reduction in city services, it is more im-



portant now than ever to provide help with our parks, making sure they stay a destination for families and neighborhood recreation. It does not require an excessive commitment just, about a day a month. You simply report the hours worked over a one year time period. Some of the things you can do include replenishing the doggie bags (VEP will continue to provide these), pick up litter, rake leaves, remove graffiti, report park hazards, sweep courts and pathways, pull weeds, care for ecosystems, plant native plants, report homeless encampments, illegal dumping, storm damage, injured or dead animals, mountain lions, and other hazards. The duties and needs will vary slight by park and your own preferences and desires. Training will be provided.

In addition, volunteers are given a certificate of adoption, a tshirt, and an invitation to an annual recognition event. After sixty hours of volunteer work your name will be placed on a plaque which will be posted at the park. If you are unsure of your time commitment, you can join forces with a neighbor and have a group adopt the park, requiring only a few hours a month per person. Picasa–One of Google's Best Kept Secrets SeniorNet Sign-up January 7, 1:30 pm

Picasa is a free software program from Google used to manage your photos. Senior-Net Willows offers 2 classes, a 4 week class to introduce you



to it and an 8 week class to aid the student in mastering the finer points of the program.

Picasa is one of the most intuitive and useful interfaces available. As you'd expect from a Google product, the search feature is top notch, including searching by tags, captions, date and location.

You can use the brightness and contrast adjustments if you wish or use Picasa's "I'm feeling lucky" button to optimize your photos. Other editing features include cropping, resizing and removing red eye.

This software enables you to share photos in many creative ways. The movie option lets you make a slideshow of your photos that includes sound, transitions, video clips and more. When you are done with your movie, click the You Tube button and post it online.

Clicking the photo collage button organizes the photos in the album into an automatic collage. You choose the options to organize the photos in a mosaic, grid formation or other. No need for artistic talent to get great results with this tool. After you're done, e-mail it, burn it to a CD as a gift, store it on a thumb drive or upload it to the Picasa web gallery online.

Overall, Picasa is a user-friendly digital photo software. Those with little to no experience uploading photos and videos, editing photos and dealing with extra gadgets can get the hang of it quickly without much trouble. All of the program's buttons are very easy to find and use, and the layout gently guides you through the process.

It is located 2175 Lincoln Avenue near the corner of Curtner Ave. Each class is \$20 for an 8 week class. Planting/Caring for Hydrangeas

Hydrangeas are an attractive perennial that call for little care. Few insects or diseases affect hydrangeas. But planting hydrangeas requires some care. After you obtain a starter, dig a hole larger than the container it came in. Place the plant in a hole where it will get a northern exposure, ensuring that the crown of the



plant is slightly above the level of the native soil. Backfill with a mix of soil with a lot of compost, using excess soil to build a watering basin. Fill the basin with water, checking to see that there is little or no settling of the plant.

Hydrangeas thrive on ample water. Feed the plant when it leafs out in the spring and every other moNth during the growing season; use about one-quarter cup of sulfate of ammonia, and spread it in a wide circle under the hydrangea and water in afterward. In hot spells, may show signs of wilting, only to recover when the sun goes down. This is a natural occurrence called "incipient wilting." It happens even if the soil is very wet.

Hydrangeas bloom on the shoots produced in the previous year. Cut off the blossoms after the flowers have faded. Prune them just above the second set of buds from the bottom of the stem. The new shoots that grow from these buds will bloom in the following year. It is hard to kill a hydrangea. After the plant is several years old, you may need to thin out the multitude of stems, removing any crossing, dead, or diseased stems. The older stems will be a darker color, with brown or gray scaly bark. These may no longer be productive and need to be pruned back to a set of buds near the base of the plant. New stems will emerge to replace the old.

November Reminders

Sprinkle some color into your winter garden, if you're not growing vegetables this year. Sow wildflower seeds, and the winter rains will water them for you. You could also plant winter flowers, such as pansies, stock, snapdragons, and primrose. I've got some cosmos that keep re-seeding themselves in a neglected former tree hole in the driveway; they grow tall and beautiful, a thing of beauty to behold every day when I leave and return. For veggies, plant those snow peas, broccoli, chard, etc. Garlic planted now can be harvested in May; set cloves (pointed end up) in soil that has good drainage. Plant about one inch deep, three to six inches apart. Also, get ready to spray fruit trees; after leaves have fallen, spray peach trees and nectarine trees with lime sulfur to control peach leaf curl. Spray apricot trees with a fixed-copper spray, coating the stems and trunk thoroughly. Continue to clip spent roses off the plants. You can expect more roses through December, even if the weather is frosty. But hold off on serious rose pruning until January.

Bulbs go in NOW

There is still time to plant spring-flowering bulbs. Most hurseries and garden centers remain well-stocked with dozens of colorful selections. To help you plan your garden, check out <u>www.bulb.com</u> for a wealth of information and tips about how to choose, plant and otherwise care for your bulbs. The site is maintained by the Netherlands Flower Bulb Info Center (where else?). Once you get those bulbs in the ground, give yourself a little instant gratification by planting winter-color annuals on top. Good choices for sunny spots include pansies, violas, primrose and Iceland Poppies. For shady or dappled spots, try cineraria and cyclamen.

A Year of Cakes

Can you smell it? Ahhhhhh, the aromas of Thanksgiving dinner. One or two whiffs of turkey roasting in the oven make your stomach growl with hunger. Consuming too much food is a given for this special time of the year when we gather together with our families and friends. I love the flavors of Autumn and early Winter-pumpkin, apples, butternut squash and all the delicious dishes you can prepare with them. Butternut squash bisque is one of my favorites along with one soup recipe I just tried recently-carrot ginger soup. Pumpkin pie and apple pie are always welcome. Here is a cake recipe using pumpkin that would be a grand addition to your Thanksgiving meal or anytime. You may want to make more than one because it doesn't hang around for long.

Pumpkin Cake Roll: Ingredients: 3 eggs, 1 cup granulated sugar, 2/3 cup canned pumpkin, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, ³/₄ cups all-purpose flour, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1 teaspoon baking powder, ¹/₂ teaspoon salt, ¹/₄ teaspoon nutmeg, 1 cup finely chopped nuts. Cream cheese filling: 6 ounces cream cheese, softened, 1 cup confectioners' sugar, ¹/₄ cup butter, softened, ¹/₂ teaspoon vanilla.

Instructions: Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease a 15x10x1 inch baking pan; line with waxed paper. Grease and flour the paper; set aside. In a large mixing bowl, beat eggs on high for 5 minutes. Gradually beat in sugar until thick and lemon-colored, about 1 minute. Add pumpkin and lemon juice, mixing well. In a small bowl combine flour, cinnamon, baking powder, salt and nutmeg; fold into the pumpkin mixture until well combined.

Spread batter into pan; sprinkle with nuts. Bake in preheated 375 degree oven for 15 minutes or until cake springs back when lightly touched. Have a clean linen towel ready. Remove from oven and immediately flip out onto towel. Remove pan, then remove waxed paper carefully. Roll cake up in towel, starting with short end. Leave for 5 minutes; unroll and let cool for 10 minutes. Re-roll in towel once again and allow to cool completely. Meanwhile beat frosting ingredients until fluffy. Carefully unroll cake. Spread filling over cake to within 1 inch of edges. Roll up again, without the towel. Cover and chill until serving. Dust with confectioners' sugar and slice into desired widths.

No appointment is necessary. The Medical staff will collect a small blood sample from your dog, which will be sent to the Wisdom Panel laboratory for analysis. Your pet's DNA results will be mailed directly to you in the next two to three weeks.

"We chose the Mars Wisdom Panel MX over other available DNA tests because it is considered to be the gold standard in the industry," said Dr. Julia Lewis, veterinarian and director of animal welfare for HSSV. "This test detects almost 160 breeds in the panel with 90% accuracy. The advantage of DNA testing using blood versus other types of specimens is that blood provides the highest quality DNA analysis."


