THE STATE MAY OWE YOU MONEY!

Two years ago a surplus developed in the State Disability Insurance (SDI) Fund as a result of fewer worker insurance claims than anticipated. The Legislature passed a law declaring that the excess money be returned to contributors through a one-time refundable tax credit of 80% of each worker's SDI taxes withheld during 1979.

The maximum refund is \$91, with average payments running about \$76.

Anyone who paid into the SDI fund in 1979, and has failed to claim their refund until now, may do so by filing an amended 1979 California personal income tax return (Form 540X) with the State Franchise Tax Board.

Most workers are entitled to this refundable tax credit, except employees of a voluntary plan employer; the self-employed or employees who have elected coverage; employees of the State of California; other public entities including public school districts; and employees whose employers do not withhold SDI but, instead, pay it as a fringe benefit.

More than five million Californians have already received their refunds, but there are still an estimated 3.6 million workers who still qualify for the credit.

The State Franchise Tax Board has a toll free number, 1-800-852-5711 to answer any questions concerning your eligibility or the method of filing.

It is your money, you are entitled to this refund.
