VEP Community Service Awards

VEP members will be asked to discuss and vote on the 2012 VEP Community Service Award program (specifics for this year). The VEP Community Service Award program has been providing Awards to High School Seniors for many years. <u>To</u> <u>qualify for the CSA Award, a high school senior must be very</u> <u>involved in volunteer activities.</u> The VEP Bylaws provide a framework for the program, but includes some flexibility to meet current needs...thus each year the membership votes to approve the program specifics.

In September, the membership approved the organization's budget for the coming year. All events and programs are now included in one all inclusive budget item amount (same processs that were used last year as well). Continuing with the criteria and amount approved last year - the membership will be asked to approve a \$1,000.00 budget.

The recommendation is to continue with the same program criteria approved for use in 2011 for the program in 2012. The specifics are as follows:

"Up to 3 awards be granted at the judges' discretion, evenly distributed among selected winners. Nominations to be solicited from AHHS, GHS, and in the VEP newsletter (for Memberat- Large). School administrators will be asked to nominate at least 2 students per school with no upper limit. No more than 1 award per category (AHHS, GHS, At-Large). Ok to grant an award in a category with only 1 nominee. Ok not to grant an award in any category, if judges feel the candidate(s) don't merit an award."

Upon member approval, nominations will be solicited during the months of February, March and first part of April. As school calendars have changed, the application and approval process have been moved forward by a few weeks. Applications will be due between the first and middle of April, with awards granted by the end of April/first part of May. Applications will be available at the above identified schools, on the VEP website at <u>www.vepca.net</u>, or by request.

If you know a deserving high school senior who is a very active volunteer, please let them know about our Community Service Awards.

Do you know CPR? I don't, but Frank's story reminds me that it's time I (and we) learned.



Pie For a Year

New Year, new beginnings, new resolutions, new blog. Pies are this year's main event-one pie per week for the year 2012.



As many other well-intentioned people, I desire to lose a few

pounds (as in a year's worth of cakes!), so my goal is to prepare the pie, cut a slice for its photo shoot, absorb a bite (or two), savor the flavor, then make a quick getaway from the scene. My family (and neighbors or whoever shows up) can consume the remainder.

This well-thought-out plan worked the first week, but this past week, somehow, I kept passing by that piece of pie sitting on the counter and I could swear a little voice was whispering, "just one more bite." Long story short (actually it didn't take that long), I finished the whole piece. Good news-I didn't eat the whole pie! We'll see what next week brings in the form of temptation.

"As American as apple pie" is a famous saying, so recipe #1 is a long-time favorite of mine, "Deep Dish Apple Pie".

Ingredients: Filling: 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ cups granulated sugar, 6 tablespoons all-purpose flour, 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon, 4-6 apples (I prefer Granny Smith), thinly sliced, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup butter. Topping: 1 tablespoon milk, 1 tablespoon granulated sugar mixed with $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon ground cinnamon.

Instructions: Make pastry (for ingredients and instructions visit blog). Preheat oven to 425 degrees. In a medium mixing bowl mix granulated sugar, flour, and cinnamon until well blended. Stir in thinly sliced apples until coated with mixture. Place half of the apple mixture atop bottom pastry; thinly slice half of butter randomly over apples. Add remaining apples and butter. Top with second crust. Brush top of pie with the milk and sprinkle with the sugar/cinnamon mixture. Cut small slits in top of pie in desired design.

Bake for 15 minutes before lowering temperature to 350 degrees. Continue baking for 35-40 minutes or until apples are tender when pierced. Transfer to wire rack to cool.

Rose Pruning Time

It's Tough-Love time for roses; that means stripping leaves, taking shears to lanky canes, and ripping out suckers. This isn't brain surgery; anybody can do it and should. You don't have to thin out the center of the plant, but you should clip an interior cane that crosses another. And



do remove the leaves, so the rose will think it's going dormant. Cut above the node, where the a new shoot will grow. And if you make a mistake, don't sweat it; roses are pretty good at handling themselves. and feed them compost if you have some. If you're interested in some easy lessons, and tips from the masters, you can get three hours of instruction and practice at San Jose's Heritage Rose Garden at Spring and Taylor (or Coleman and Taylor) from 9 a.m. to noon every Wednesday and Friday. Let the aphids come, and then two weeks later, the ladybugs will come and eat the aphids.

Frostbitten Plants Come Back Slowly

Plants that bloom too early can be victims of frost bite this time of year, particularly jade plants. If that happens to you, don't throw them away just because they aren't flowering any more. It takes two or more years for them to recover enough to initiate flowers again. When we had the big freeze in '89, some plants were just mush afterward. It took three years before they bloomed again. If you cover them with a blanket, the new flowers can be bent over, and they never straighten out.

Some gardeners construct a frame and cover frost-sensitive plants with clear plastic or cloth. Some place an extension cord with a light inside, turning it on at night when temperatures drop below freezing. You can have your own greenhouse that way.

Also, keep the frost protection handy. Plants that are well watered have more frost resistance than those that are starved for water. As overnight temps dip, tropical plants, citrus, avocado, bougainvillea and other sensitive plants will need protection. I know we have a poinsettia that we have covered all this winter, and it's still bright with red blossoms. Compost some of your leaves.

Want color plantings? Winter-bedding plants are a top choice for quick color in the garden Since the winter season is the time of short days and cold nights, it's best to stick with pansies, viola, primrose, sweet alyssum, stock, snapdragons and English daisies. We have some snapdragons from last year that are still blooming, and will continue into next year. For larger plantings, go for bareroot roses, fruit and nut trees, berry vines and grapes.

November VEP Meeting Synopsis

VEP was pleased to host Santa Clara County Supervisor, Mike Wasserman as the featured guest speaker for November's meeting. This was the Supervisors first presentation to VEP in his official role since being elected in November 2010. He provided meeting attendees with an overview of



his first year in office, highlighting activities and accomplishments. One accomplishment the Supervisor shared was the result of a campaign commitment to the wineries in the South County – which was to look at current laws affecting them and to determine what could be improved. One such county requirement exceeded state requirements – requiring wineries to have a 100,000 gallon water storage tank. He facilitated hav-



ing it reduced to 7,500 gallons, thus providing significant savings to the county's wineries. The Supervisor spoke with pride in being able to balance the County budget without using "onetime funds", this happening for the first time this century. He worked to implement

new cost savings ideas at the County including his Comprehensive Attrition Plan (CAP), and all employees (including the Board of Supervisors) received reductions in compensation. A two-tier benefits plan (reducing compensation for <u>new</u> employees) was implemented. He also encouraged promotion of employees from within. 
