

May Meeting Synopsis

President Rodgers welcomed everyone to the meeting and continued to encourage those in attendance to enjoy the "ice cream social" as well as not being hesitant or shy about having an additional serving of ice cream, while continuing to network with neighbors. Everyone took her advise "to heart" - so much so that it was difficult to get everyone's attention to begin the formal portion of the meeting!

As Councilmember Khamis was unable to attend this meeting (which is rare - he attends almost every VEP meeting), Council Assistant Dora Gonzalez provided an informative update. Of particular note, she included an overview of information on an upcoming important initiative by the County of Santa Clara. This initiative will be of particular assistance and very helpful to the residents of the City of San Jose when it is completely implemented. That initiative is called "Laura's Law." This specifically is to assist in the management of those individuals who have mental illness, and who display aggressive or violent behavior. While this is a small percentage of the total number of people who suffer from mental illness, Laura's Law, is an important additional option that can be used in helping this group of individuals. The law was passed by the State of California several years ago to: 1) assist families who continue to support loved ones with mental illness, who need assistance with family members who may fit into this category of displaying aggressive or violent behavior; and 2) some individuals who are homeless and also suffer from mental illness. Dora also was very gracious in responding to questions from the audience. As there were some items that she could not answer immediately, she promised to get the answers and provide that information back to VEP (see those questions and responses following this article).

Ms. Rodgers then introduced the primary guest speaker for the evening, Eric Goodrich, Park Manager for Martial Cottle Park.

Eric provided an interesting overview of both the status of issues/ projects that are ongoing in the Park, as well as increasing everyone's interest in the upcoming planned 3rd Annual Martial Cottle Park Harvest/Fall Festival, scheduled for Saturday, October 7th. Of particular interest was the status of improvements to the original portion of the Perimeter Trail – which is completed, and..... the opening/access to the remaining portion of the Trail beyond west Chynoweth and south toward the freeway and Blossom Hill Road.

Eric also thanked VEP members who are volunteers for the Park. He then encouraged others who may be interested in volunteer opportunities to contact him or the Volunteer Coordinator.

Eric briefly updated everyone on the activities and items of interest – such as tractors and other vehicles, which are so popular at the Harvest Festival. Eric graciously answered several guestions. One such question was information regarding the program to help Veterans learn about and participate in farming as a career path. He proudly mentioned that the contract farmer for Martial Cottle – Jacobs Farm del Cabo has a long history of providing this opportunity. He also intends to have one of the Veterans at Martial Cottle come to the VEP meeting to provide an overview of the program.

He closed by thanking everyone, and encouraging them to attend....and enjoy, the Harvest Festival on Saturday, October 7th from 10am to 3pm. He also encouraged people to walk or bike if possible. However, parking will be available on-site, for a fee of \$6.00.

President Rodgers thanked Eric, and said she knew everyone was looking forward to attending the Festival. Vice President Katherine Decker helped with the raffle at the end of the meeting. The raffle drawing was for a "free VEP membership." Steve Strout was the winner of the drawing – Ms. Rodgers congratulated him on winning the raffle, and asked him to fill out a membership envelope with his information. She also announced that the next VEP meeting would be October 24th rather than Tuesday, October 31st – as that is Halloween.

Ms. Rodgers thanked everyone for coming, and asked for assistance in stacking chairs and cleaning up the Community Room. Several people stayed and continued to enjoy visiting with neighbors on a variety of issues.

Answers to Questions Asked by Attendees at VEP's September 26th Meeting Responses Provided by Council Assistant Dora Gonzalez

1. Questions regarding the large white dumpster currently located under the Hwy 87 overpass on the south side of Chynoweth, ie. Who does it belong to? Caltrans? Is it going to be there permanently - emptied occasionally?

Answer - dumpster issues/questions have been reported to Caltrans.

- 2. What is Laura's Law? See article in this edition of the VEP Newsletter from Councilmember Khamis.
- 3. What are small cameras mounted on poles along Chynoweth and Snell? These cameras have been installed in several areas of the City (Citywide) and are there to measure the traffic patterns to help sync the traffic lights. It is less destructive to our roads, than putting sensors under the road and having to dig into the road.
- 4. Question about illegal dumping at the end of Chynoweth has been reported.
- 5. Light at the end of Chynoweth has been added.

What is "Laura's Law"?

Laura's Law was passed into law several years ago by the State of California. It essentially is a process that can be utilized to require (force) individuals with severe mental illness to participate in counseling and take prescribed medications. Each County in the State has to decide/approve whether or not to initiate the detailed processes required for implementation in that specific county. To date, 14 counties in California have chosen to do so; with the largest, Los Angeles County, just completing a 3-year long process of implementation. Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors has recently voted to begin the process toward implementation.

It is important to note that the majority of individuals with mental illness are not aggressive or violent, and on their own – decide to seek medical assistance. Additionally, every adult has the right to say "no" to requirements of medical intervention. However, for the small minority who do display aggressive and/or violent behavior which could lead to, or already has led to, them being a danger to themselves, or someone else, this initiative requires them to seek and participate in counseling, and to take prescribed medications.

Laura's Law is intended to just be one more option available to assist both individuals who need medical intervention/assistance, and to provide a legal option to assist families and/or other involved residents in a given County. Note: this goes through each County, as many of these services are overseen by Counties and federal funding for social services comes from the Federal government, to the State, and then to the Counties to administer/ oversee. Mt. Umunhum Opens to the Public

On Saturday, September 16^{th} , access to the top of Mt. Umunhum officially was opened to the public by the Mid-Peninsula Open Space Authority. A ribbon-cutting ceremony culminated the week's festivities which included tours for many of the invited special guests. The majority of special guests were the former Air Force personnel, who had staffed the Mt. Umunhum Air Force Station, as well as the now famous Radar Tower - the last remaining portion of the Air Force Station. (Note: Special guests also included family members of the previous Air Force personnel. Included in this group was VEP Board Member/Secretary Adina Pierce, her husband, and mother and father-in-law - who had been an Air Force staff member in the formerly functioning Radar Tower). Additional guests were elected officials including Councilmember Johnny Khamis and, both staff and public members of Mid-Peninsula Open Space Authority. The public had been invited to participate in the activities of Opening Day; however the limited number of online tickets to the event were quickly reserved in just a matter of minutes.

The public, however, could begin visiting the definitely spectacular view atop Mt. Umunhum beginning Monday, September 18th. This site provides a 360 degree view: to the north of San Francisco, south to Monterey and beyond, east toward the Sierra foothills and west out into the Pacific Ocean. A visual reminder as to why this site was originally selected, as well as its significant importance and radar enhanced ability to protect a large and important portion of the West Coast of the United States.

Mt Umunhum has held special significance for several decades to the many residents of the South Bay in general, and more specifically to residents of San Jose and Almaden Valley. It is not unusual to hear residents speak of the fact that when they are flying commercial aircraft, coming from the south into San Jose Airport, the important landmark to the west – is definitely Mt. Umunhum – indicating that passengers on commercial aircraftare coming into San Jose proper, and....almost home!

The site historically held a special place of significance a local Native American Tribe: the Ohlone. Representatives of the tribe were included as special guests, and also played an important role in having a prayer circle included at the site on top of Mt Umunhum.

As the road leading up to, and down from, the top of Mt. Umunhum is winding with many curves, as well as steep, visitors in cars are cautioned to be especially careful, and to drive slowly.

President and Founding Board Member Sam Drake, provided information as to the status of the Radar Tower. While it "has been saved" there remains a significant amount of work to be done (it continues to be closed to the public). The owner of the property is Mid-Peninsula Open Space Authority. The issues of what needs to be done to restore, protect, and make the Radar Tower safe, is still to be determined; as is the cost to accomplish the above, and...who will pay for the restoration.

The Conservancy will continue to keep everyone informed as to the issues listed above, as well as the progress to resolve those issues for the benefit of the public. In the meantime, everyone is encouraged to visit the "top of Mt. Umunhum"and enjoy!

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

What You Need To Know About The So Called Seniors Home Initative

Last month, lawyers hired by wealthy developers filed "notice of intent" with the City Clerk to begin collecting signatures for a ballot measure that they call the "Evergreen Senior Homes Initiative."

The proposal claims to create affordable housing for seniors and veterans, an objective with which no one can take issue. The problem is that this proposal is far more - and far different - than what it claims to be.

As we've begun to analyze this 300+ page proposal (https://goo.gl/5zaAVR), it has become increasingly clear that these wealthy developers have created an extremely misleading initiative that circumvents the rules everyone else must follow and will have detrimental impacts on our residents. For example:

- While the initiative makes several references to "veterans housing," it includes no enforceable commitments to ensure that any veteran will actually live in one of these homes.
- While these developers have framed their initiative as a proposal for affordable housing, they are actually proposing to build a gated community in Evergreen made up of predominantly single-family homes, at market price (in today's dollars, \$1 million or more).
- While the initiative calls for constructing some affordable apartments, they've actually watered down San Jose's existing affordable housing requirements in ways that greatly limit- the number of homes available to San Jose's low-income families.
- Despite the gridlock choking the Evergreen area, this initiative exempts the developers from paying the required traffic impact fees that all other developers have to pay to reduce congestion.
- Although framed as "senior housing," the initiative would enable any 55-year old executive with teenagers to buy one of these homes, which will generate similar traffic impacts as other singlefamily housing developments.
- By taking their plan straight to the ballot box, they are bypassing the established community engagement process by which surrounding neighbors, and any other concerned residents, can offer their input to help shape new development projects.

These facts all point to the heart of this initiative: a group of wealthy developers seek to enrich themselves by creating a different set of rules for themselves than the rules by which everyone else abides. Their proposal would significantly alter the City's existing General Plan (which was the product of input from more than 5,000 San Jose residents) in favor of some new, more profitable development guidelines that they literally wrote by themselves, for themselves.

Finally, it's worth noting that some of the elements proposed by the initiative would apply citywide. As a result, beyond the impacts on our Evergreen neighborhoods, this initiative could have serious ramifications - and could spur a host of similar new developments - in neighborhoods and communities across the city that could undermine San Jose's job base and destroy open spaces and hillsides.

Helping the Bees One Small Garden at a Time: Ways You Can Make A Difference

Concerns over declining bee populations are rising and many people are anxious to know how they can help. Individuals may not be able to remedy this situation on their own, but they can make a difference even with a small garden. Get creative about using the space you have to give bees a safe place to flourish.



<u>Small garden spaces can produce big results:</u> A small garden in your yard or a handful of pots, a vertical wall, or hanging baskets on a balcony with the right flowers can be a valuable resource for bees. BalconyContainerGardening.com suggests packing as much diversity into your garden as you can. Many flowers work well in this type of setting, but numerous fruits and vegetables can be a good fit too. Consider growing rosemary, peppers, lavender, cilantro, or berries, and incorporate flowers like crocus, poppies, buttercups, and dahlias. Try to put together not only a rainbow of blossom colors, but a combination of flowering plants that will pop at different times throughout the bee season (May through Oct.).

Think outside the box: BuzzAboutBees.net notes that you can get creative in maximizing the space available in your garden. Use trees, arches, or other vertical features in the area to support climbing plants like wisteria, honeysuckle, and jasmine. You may even be able to hang some baskets from strong tree branches to incorporate more variety. Not all flowering plants do well in a hanging basket, but fuchsias, marigolds, heathers, and ivy are good options to consider. HoneyLove.org notes that having a number of different types of plants in your garden will invite a variety of bee species. If you are working with a small amount of space, try to have at least three different flowers planted. Focus on using native plants that will appeal to the types of bees found in your area. Staff at local gardening centers can often provide useful insight on which plants may work best in your region.

Bees need more than just plants to thrive: If you have a plot of land to use for your bee garden, be sure to provide opportunities for bees to nest. Mow your grass less often than is typical or leave it a bit long to give bees a place to hide and feed. Leave some space open without a mulch covering, since some species prefer to burrow into the dirt to nest. You can also help by keeping some raw materials like dead wood, dry grasses, and small brush in the area for bees to use. Bees also need to have water available, so create some muddy puddles throughout your space for this purpose. If you are container gardening, add a dish filled with small rocks and water for bees to use as a water source. These insects also need protection from the elements, so incorporate shelter to keep them safe from the rain, wind, and cold. This can be as simple as allowing some space between plants so bees have a protected spot to go when the weather is rough.

If you are worried about the bee population reductions that have been escalating in recent years, you can step up and make a difference. Look for opportunities to plant bee-friendly flowers in a small plot or a few pots and plan for ways they can easily nest and access water. Remember that there is no one-size-fits-all approach to building this type of garden and every bit of effort makes a difference. 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County Explores Laura's Law



On September 13, 2017 the Health and Hospital Committee of the County Board of Supervisors received a report from the Director of Behavioral Health Services on Assisted Outpatient Treatment, commonly known as Laura's Law, or AB 1421. Supervisor Cindy Chavez requested this study on May 9, 2017 in response to concerns regarding options for residents in need of mental health treatment. I applaud Supervisor Chavez for requesting a report on AB 1421 ("Laura's Law").

Assistant Outpatient Treatment is an important option for families in crisis which has been adopted by 14 counties, including San Francisco, Alameda, Contra Costa, San Mateo, Los Angeles, and San Diego. I hope that the County continues to look at AB 1421 and that the Board of Supervisors pursue it as a tool to bring mental health patients into treatment. A portion of the people living on our streets, along railroad tracks, and in creek beds suffer from mental health issues – some are severely impaired.

As we work to find better solutions for the unhoused in our community, it is clear that we cannot solve the homelessness issue for these folks without employing more and better mental health services throughout the County – especially here in San Jose.


