VEP's November Meeting Preview

There will be a discussion regarding Holiday Wellness. It will cover basic tips for feeling less overwhelmed during the holiday season. This will be an informative presentation to help all of us enjoy the holiday season more.

VEP's October 2018 Meeting Summary

Our monthly presentation was from the San Jose Police Department's Lieutenant Carlos Acosta and Nancy Rueda of the Crime Prevention Unit. Lieutenant Acosta reported that there had been 7 burglaries, 5 stolen vehicles, 4 assaults, and 3 thefts in the VEP area over the previous 30 days. Community members reported that there is an increase in the number of cars racing at the end of Chynoweth near Martial Cottle Park; that Chynoweth and Barron Park have suspicious cars parked at about 4:30pm every day; that drivers are speeding through the stop sign near Gunderson; and that cars are parking for long periods of time near VEP Parks. Lieutenant Acosta stated that vehicles can park legally on the street for up to 72 hours, and that any vehicles parked longer than that can be reported to SJPD. Lieutenant Acosta also mentioned that if there are issues or suspicious vehicles or activity, call 911 if there is immediate danger, or call 311 if there is a non-urgent situation to report. Finally, he said that reporting all issues will assist the department in increasing their ability to cover the VEP area. He also gave some tips for ensuring that delivered packages aren't stolen over the holidays such as considering installing a surveillance system.

Ms. Rueda distributed important phone numbers for City of San Jose and County Services and San Jose Police Department Services. She also presented the areas covered by the Crime Prevention Unit and discussed the Neighborhood Watch program. She said that to set up a Neighborhood Watch program neighbors must have at least 10 households attending the Neighborhood Watch session; that the 2 hour session beginning at 6:30 or 7:00 PM on a Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday must be held indoors and at the end of the Neighborhood Watch session, each household would receive a Neighborhood Watch sign. Finally, she described the MySanJose app that can be used to report Graffiti. If it is gang related it will be removed within 2 hours and a confirmation will be posted through the app.

Councilmember Khamis reviewed the propositions on the midterm election ballot; provided an update on the Santa Clara Country land deal for the widening of Branham Lane to four lanes at Martial Cottle Park; and gave us an update on the homeless stating that CalTrans is cleaning up the shopping carts, and that fencing is being put up under Highway 87.





As I write this on the one-hundredth anniversary of the armistice that ended the War to End All Wars (the people that gave WW1 this name had too much faith in human nature), I think about service to the nation and service to the community. I turned 18 just as the Viet Nam war was coming to an end, so, I wasn't asked to serve. My grandfathers, born in 1887 and 1890, were too old to serve at the outbreak of WWI but supported the war efforts on the home front in their own way. My father, however, left college on his 21st birthday, shortly after the bombing of Pearl Harbor, to serve in the Army Air Corp as a navigator on troop transport airplanes in Europe for the duration. I can't help but to think of the sacrifice that so many young men and women made to keep the free world free and safe during both of these world-wide conflicts and that their sacrifices enable us to live free and prosperous lives today.

This is my second stint as VEP president, and I serve my community gladly in honor of the people that served and sacrificed without which our community might not otherwise exist. I was heartened to work with roughly 35 other community and VEP members as well as City employees, a couple of weeks ago working on neighborhood clean-up and beautification projects during the Fourth Annual Dave Fadness Memorial Beautification Day (See the complete article on page 4 of this issue). We got a lot done at Vista Park, along Chynoweth and Branham, and at the Parkview parks. During the next clean-up day, we will concentrate more on the Parkview neighborhoods. We also need to thank Aiko Fadness, first, for arranging the donation of, and providing the goodies in the community room at the beginning of the event, and for allowing us to honor the memory of her late husband and outstanding community member, Dave Fadness, with this event. We also need to thank the Safeway stores at Almaden and Cherry, and at Branham and Snell, as well as the Starbuck's Coffee at Capitol and Timberloop Dr. (next to Home Depot) for their contributions of coffee and gift cards used to purchase the goodies that we enjoyed before we started working. 

Request a "Hold for Pick Up" or "Hold Mail" at your local USPS	
Require signature (someone will still need to sign!)	
Use a planter or gate to obstruct the street view of your porch	
Do NOT let packages sit on your porch, especially overnight	
Track your package & set up Delivery Alert then text a neighbor or friend to grab it for you!
