### VEP's November 2018 Meeting Summary By Laura McGeever and Greg West

The attendance at our November meeting was reasonably small, with about 20 people in attendance including board members. However, this did allow for some interesting and in depth discussion of neighborhood related topics. Greg West reported that Santa in the Park was attended by about 40 children and thanked those who helped set up and brought refreshments for the children.

Laura McGeever then presented some holiday wellness tips including remedies for holiday blues including loneliness, loss, and missing holidays past. If anyone is interested in getting a copy of Laura's presentation, send an email to VEPEditor@gmail.com.

Greg then presented a plaque to previous treasurer and board member Ginger Cardona recognizing her dedicated service to the organization from 2009 to 2018. Greg also mentioned that other officers' service would be recognized at future meetings.



The group then discussed the Holiday Home Decoration Contest, deciding on three categories: Best Decorated Home; Best Theme Decorated Home; and Best Decorated Street. Best Decorated Home and Best Theme Decorated Home would receive \$25 gift cards to Oakridge Mall, and Best Decorated Street would get bragging rights. The judges were Greg West, Cindy Bosworth, Lisa Sanchez and her two daughters (winners are reported in the President's Corner article).

We discussed the membership drive, the need for remittance envelopes, the 1st of the year postal rate increase, and the membership solicitation letter. We also discussed adding a feature to the Newsletter highlighting areas of the community for people to explore (see the first installment by Lynne Kinsey elsewhere in this edition); traffic, including speeding on Branham and Capitol and possible remedies; and the widening of Branham Lane at Martial Cottle Park. Finally, we noted that there has been stronger fencing put up on Branham Lane to minimize the encampments.



-ing there. In addition, a CalTrans crew was out on January 11th cleaning up the encampments at Hwy 87 and Chynoweth (we will try to provide more detail about this and report back next month).

Homelessness in Silicon Valley is an issue that needs to be dealt with and solved, but allowing encampments, especially in the cold and wet weather that we've been having recently, is the wrong way. In addition, the accumulated junk at many encampments is not only and eyesore, but is a safety and health risk, not only for the campers, but for people walking by, and especially for the crew that cleaned it up. The City and County do provide services, funded by our tax money, for these unfortunate homeless folks.

Kelly Hemphill, Homelessness Response Manager for the City of San Jose will be our main speaker this month discussing homelessness in San Jose and what solutions/strategies the City has for this issue.

### Neighborhood Commission Update

### By District 10 Neighborhood Commissioner, Rich Giammona

What is the City of San Jose Neighborhood Commission? We are a group of 20 citizens (2 from each district in San Jose) elected by community leaders, to work on issues such as code enforcement, public safety, department of transportation, and budget. As your representative on the commission, I've been primarily focused on the Citizens Oversight Committee that is monitoring the spending of the  $\frac{1}{4}$ -cent Sales Tax Measure passed in 2016. If you forget, below, please find a summary of the measure details.

To fund essential City services such as: improving police response to reduce violent crimes and burglaries; improving 911/emergency medical/fire response times; repairing potholes and streets; expanding gang prevention; and maintaining the City's long-term financial stability, shall the City of San Jose enact a ¼ percent sales tax for 15 years, providing about \$40 million annually, requiring Independent Citizens Oversight with public review of spending, and all revenues controlled locally?

Currently we are working with the budget department in reviewing the spending of money from 2017-2018. The report will be released by the committee most likely late June 2019. I'll keep you posted.

## Have You Noticed the New Trees on Capitol?

With the various changes and improvement projects on Capitol Expressway in the recent years, all the trees had been removed between Narvaez and Copperfield. In addition, trees had to be removed due to accidents between Copperfield and Vistapark.

With a lot of research and communication, we were able to work with the county to get the trees replaced, increasing the beauty, safety, and greenness of Capitol.

We thank the county for working with the federal government to get a grant to replace the trees. "I am proud of the latest work that the county's roads and airports department has done to plant several trees on Capitol Expressway between Copperfield drive and Narvaez Avenue," said Santa Clara County Supervisor, Mike Wasserman.

The Roads and Airports Department has said that the new trees will be connected to an irrigation system, with a timer, and the current plan is to include them in the maintenance schedule with the existing trees in the median.

Additional work is still taking place down Capitol.



### The "Reducing Crime and Keeping California Safe Act of 2020" and Prop 57

The San José police have recently announced that they have begun turning suspects accused of gun crimes over to Federal prosecutors so that they might obtain harsher penalties in Federal court than they would in State courts. These offenders have been getting off with light penalties in State courts due to reductions in mandatory minimum sentencing created by Proposition 57. I am thrilled with this new approach that San Jose Police Chief Eddie Garcia has implemented to help fix the unintended consequences of recent, voter-approved public safety reforms and keep us safe.

Proposition 57, approved by California voters in 2016, gives "nonviolent" offenders the ability to apply for early parole, as well as other opportunities at lessened punishment provided they complete rehabilitation programs. This poses an issue for the safety of the community because several inherently violent crimes are now classified as nonviolent.

The following are not considered to be violent felonies under now-current California law: Human trafficking of a child, abducting a minor for prostitution, rape by intoxication, rape of an unconscious person, felony sexual penetration when drugs are used or the victim is unconscious, drive by shooting, assault with a firearm, felony domestic violence, felony assault with a deadly weapon, serial arson, solicitation to commit murder, assault with caustic chemicals, assault by a caregiver on a child under 8 that results in death or coma, felony assault using force likely to produce great bodily injury, false imprisonment/taking a hostage when avoiding arrest or to use as a shield, assaulting a police officer with or without a firearm, exploding a bomb to injure people, felony hate crime, any felony when a deadly weapon is used, felony use of force or threats against a witness or victim of a crime, felony elder or dependent abuse, and conspiracy to commit any of the above offenses.

San José detectives will now be working with the FBI on cases where a gun is used so that the FBI may consider the case for Federal prosecution. This would allow prosecutors to sentence violent criminals with significantly longer mandatory minimum sentences than if only state charges were applied.

This Federal prosecution tactic will be strictly focused on the following crimes: armed robberies, armed carjacking, felony arrests for possessing handguns, and drug trafficking. Crimes where a gun was fired, and not fired, but present during the crime, will be treated with the same level of seriousness, because of the potential risk of harm to the community.

Proponents of Proposition 57 need not worry, since San José detectives are only focusing on these four crimes, since the SJPD's focus is on violent offenders. This will not eliminate Proposition 57 in any way, but rather offers a creative solution for the unintended consequences created by its passage.

I am grateful to Chief Garcia for his passion for closing the revolving door of criminals re-entering the system after only brief prison or jail time. This new focus by the San José Police Department will strengthen their relationship with the community and help keep us safe from repeat, violent offenders. 2019 has kicked off in full gear and Santa Clara County is wellpoised to meet our housing, safety, and community service goals. Since the Affordable Housing Bond passed in November 2016, the County has approved 19 multi-family housing developments across six cities, equating to 1,437 new affordable apartments and 484 renovated ones. By collaborating with the City of San Jose, the Housing Authority and Destination: Home, the "All the Way Home"

housing effort has resulted in housing for 1,237 local veterans to date and our Landlord Incentives Program has increased ongoing funding for supportive housing programs for homeless veterans by \$1.8 million annually.



I am also proud that the County approved \$10 million in matching funds for many new allinclusive playgrounds for children of all abilities. Soon our County will have Magical Bridge Playgrounds located in San Jose, Morgan Hill, Sunnyvale, Mountain View and Palo Alto to provide a fun space for people with autism, sensory challenges, cognitive developmental, physical disabilities, as well as those without special needs. In

Sunnyvale, Mountain View and Palo Alto to provide a fun space for people with autism, sensory challenges, cognitive developmental, physical disabilities, as well as those without special needs. In addition, we just approved several more playgrounds including one at Lake Almaden. Through another collaborative effort between the County and the City of San Jose, **safety and traffic on Branham Lane and** 

the City of San Jose, safety and traffic on Branham Lane and Snell Ave will be improved. Thanks to an innovative exchange of parkland, plans are now moving forward with a street-widening project near Martial Cottle Park. I am grateful for Councilmember Johnny Khamis's dedication to working with us on this win-win for County residents.

I firmly believe that 2019 will be another great year for our County residents. The reason why Santa Clara County is one of the best places to live in the country is because we all work to improve the lives of everyone. And last but not least, I hope 2019 is a healthy year for all of you!
