### **VEP April Meeting Preview**

Justin Burks from Watershed Watchers will talk to us about graywater installation and resources for your home to save costs on, and conserve water. The Watershed Watch Campaign is a public education initiative of the Santa Clara Valley Urban Runoff Pollution Prevention Program (SCVURPPP), an association of fifteen separate government agencies in Santa Clara Valley. The Campaign is dedicated to raising awareness about protecting watersheds and preventing storm water pollution. (For more information about "graywater," in advance of the VEP Community Meeting, please see the article by Lisa Sanchez, on Page 4 of this newsletter.)

In addition, we will nominate officers for the upcoming year for election in May (*Please see article in this issue, on Page 3*). Finally, we will ask members in attendance to ratify the board's decision to provide up to \$500 in matching funds to be given to Friends of Martial Cottle Park (FOMCP) for purchase and planting of hedgerows and associated plants around the community gardens at Martial Cottle Park. This planting will help to control insects in the gardens (*Please see the "President's Corner" article, on Page 2, for more information*).

### **VEP's March Meeting Summary**

Eric Goodrich, Program Manager for Martial Cottle Park, began his presentation by mentioning that Martial Cottle Park opened nearly 4 years ago, on May 15, 2015. He gave an update on the "Life Estate," saying that it will not be ready for public viewing for several years. The estate property in the house needs to be properly cataloged and the house needs to be made safe for the public. Many of the items in the house have been there since it was built in 1883. The park Visitor Center, however, is fully staffed 7 days a week with winter hours from 10AM to 2PM and summer hours from 10AM to 4PM.

Eric went on to state that the park offers a variety of programs, many for 2nd and 3rd grade school children, with 140 programs conducted in 2018. (For more information, please see the article in this newsletter, provided by Martial Cottle Park staff, on Page 5.) He also highlighted the volunteer program for the park and that volunteers contributed 11,600 hours in 2018. The Park trails have an average of 900 trail users per day as counted by trail counters installed by the department at each of the 7 entrances to the park.

Eric told us something about each of the five park partners: Jacob Farms, UC Extension, Master Gardeners, 4H Small Farms, and Our City Forest. He said that Jacob Farms is experiencing a labor shortage and has moved to planting less labor intensive crops and more U-pick berry crops. 4H is tending to some newborn animals at the park as well as a recently delivered herd of sheep. Work by UC Extension is pending the approval of a new grant for research.

Eric said that the Community Gardens are planned to open next spring with 90 beds planned. The beds will by 10'x10' and 10'x20'. The gardens will be managed with the City of San Jose with the City managing the bed rental. Garden bed renters will be required to attend a Community Gardens class to ensure a "good neighbor garden" experience for everyone involved.

Finally, Eric mentioned upcoming park events, including the Spring Celebration and Spring Garden Market on April 13<sup>th</sup> (this eve-



### **President's Corner**

Eric Goodrich's presentation at last month's VEP Community Meeting got me thinking, once again, about what a great asset Martial Cottle Park is to our neighborhood. Due to Walter Lester's, and his family's, tremendous generosity, foresight, and desire to give back to the community (OK, and Walter's effort to avoid paying a ruinous estate tax after the death of his sister, Edith!), we now have roughly 290 acres of open space in our back yard, in perpetuity, that, according to County Parks, an average of 900 people a day visit and enjoy. I suspect that most of those 900 daily users are VEP neighbors.

Had developers had their way with the property that is now the park, the City probably would have allowed them to build it out at roughly 100 units per acre because light rail is relatively close. Do the math: 29,000 new units and 80,000 or 90,000 new neighbors. Instead, we have a truly urban open space!

Long time VEP neighbors and members, Joyce and Bob Chesnos, are deeply involved in Friends of Martial Cottle Park (FOMCP), a 501(c)(3) charitable organization whose mission is "to inspire the community to care for, learn about, and enjoy Martial Cottle Park and the agricultural heritage of Santa Clara Valley." Besides helping to provide more than 11,000 volunteer hours for the park in 2018, FOMCP is raising money to fund hedgerow plantings around the planned community gardens in the park to help with insect control for the gardens. This will be a several thousand dollar effort, according to Bob and Joyce, and I think VEP members can help. Here's how:

We have an anonymous donor willing to put up \$250 as a dollar-for-dollar matching grant to the first \$250 in donations from VEP members. The VEP board has approved an additional \$500 dollar-for-dollar matching grant (subject to member ratification at our April meeting) to match the next \$500 in donations from VEP members. If we can exhaust both of these matching grants, we would generate \$1500 for FOMCP. Since FOMCP is a 501(c)(3) organization, any contribution to them is tax deductible.

We will make sure that both your contribution and the matching funds get to FOMCP, and that you will receive a note from the organization, acknowledging and thanking you for your contribution.


### What Is Graywater?



### Discover the Past Through the Eyes of a Child

If you are looking for a new rewarding adventure, well we have the program for you! Martial Cottle Park is seeking school program docents to assist with our outdoor education program. In the last year our programs have doubled, and we need your help.

The school program, "Martial Cottle Ranch Children," is a ranch based hands-on activity program aligned with the California Content Standards for second and third grade students. During the 1.5-hour program, students learn about actual children who lived on the ranch at different times during 1900 and 1942. The activities stations give students the opportunity to experience ranch chores for which children of similar ages would have been responsible, daily.



Throughout the program, students compare historic photographs to discover the agricultural heritage of the Santa Clara Valley as well as how daily life and land use has changed between c. 1900 and now.

Discovering the past through the eyes of a child is a very rewarding experience. Help the park open doors to educational opportunities for children to experience the Cottle ranch and its rich history. If you love being active outdoors and history, this is the perfect opportunity for you. We encourage anyone who is interested in volunteering to contact our education department to learn more about this unique experience. Each volunteer will be given site-specific training as well as time to shadow the program until they are comfortable teaching a station on their own. To ensure you have an enjoyable zoo visit, these ideas might help:

- Look at their website before you go. You will find driving directions and parking locations, as well as anything else you need:

- Wear layered-clothes to be ready for any early morning weather changes.
- Take water with you and possibly a snack.
- They will either have printed schedules for the day, or have them posted throughout the park.
- Take advantage of some of their "just-for-seniors" activities.
- There may be information on special animals to see new babies, animals that are new to the park, unusual animals that will be included in the docents' talks, which are usually very interesting.
- There may be an early puppet show in the morning or you can catch the first one after 10 am.
- There may be a few rides running or you can get on the train and the merry-go-round in the morning or right after 10 am when the park opens.
- Bring a camera or use your phone to take pictures based on a theme. One day I took pictures of different textures (different tree barks, animals' fur & skin). Another time I only took pictures of leaves and flowers. I have taken pictures of animal sculptures and the animals embedded into the walking paths.
- Notice things you have never seen before.
- Plan to go at least once or treat yourself to an outing every month.

### **Bond Honesty - Voters Deserve Transparency**

Last month, the City Council discussed whether to push for changes to AB 195 that requires local bond measures to include key information to inform taxpayers what the bonds will cost them. I oppose any change that would hide this essential taxpayer information from voters. Please find my opinion piece, below, reprinted from SanJoseSpotlight.com, to read about my views on the importance of AB 195's Bond Honesty provisions!

After years of property taxes being imposed by well-intentioned but misleading ballot measures, the State Legislature passed - and then-Governor Brown signed - AB195 in February 2017.



This law requires that municipalities inform voters of the potential tax implications of all bond measures - basically, how much taxpayers will pay, the cost-per-unit of taxable value, and the duration of the tax. I call it Bond Honesty. In the past, many bonds were

approved with no reference, in the 75-word ballot summary, that a "yes" vote would impose a cost to the taxpayer.

San Jose Evergreen Community College District's 2016 Measure C is a perfect example of how bond measures omitted the fact that they create a cost to the taxpayer. The ballot summary read: "To repair/ upgrade classrooms to prepare students/ veterans for jobs/ university transfer by repairing/ building nursing, engineering, vocational, technology, science/ job training classrooms, improving campus, earthquake safety/ disabled access, remove asbestos/ lead paint, acquiring, constructing, repairing sites, facilities/ equipment, shall San Jose-Evergreen Community College District issue \$748,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, no money for administrators' salaries/ pensions, requiring citizen oversight, independent audits, all funds used locally?"

Nowhere in this description, designed to "sell" the bond to the voting public, does it let the voters know that these bonds are paid for with a tax on the value of their property or how much it is estimated to cost them. Not once is the word "tax" even mentioned! Unless the voter went and read the full ballot language (usually printed in a separate booklet or provided separately online), one would not know that a "yes" vote would cost one money.

Now, after the failure of a very few 2018 bond ballot measures, there is a growing demand to eliminate this requirement for the next election cycle.

Opponents of the Bond Honesty law are saying that the 75 word limit on the ballot is not adequate to properly inform the public about the benefits of the bond and also the costs, so they are pushing to have the State Legislature suspend the requirements of AB195 requirements until the law's language is changed.

While I realize it may be difficult to sum up a ballot measure in 75 words. I would hope that our State Legislature maintains the requirement to inform voters that local bond measures will need to be paid for by a tax on their property.

Instead, if more words are needed to describe bond measures, the sensible thing to do would be for the Legislature to increase the word count from 75 to 100 words. Let's keep our bond measures honest - don't remove the requirement that helps us be betterinformed voters.

### **County Update**

In the wake of the tragic death of Bambi Larson, many in our community have raised questions about the County's policies related to cooperation with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). While state law and rulings from federal courts about the U.S. Constitution completely prohibit the County from honoring detainer requests from ICE, the County currently does-and has alwayshonored judicial warrants from ICE and other federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies. Judicial warrants allow the County to directly transfer an individual to ICE in handcuffs.

I am in favor of removing individuals who have committed serious and violent crimes, and have been convicted of doing so, from our communities however and whenever possible. On Tuesday, April 9, I proposed a change to the County's policy that received support from a majority of my Board colleagues. This referral asks County Counsel to update the County's current policy to reflect the current law on detainer requests, to reaffirm that the County has and will honor all judicial warrants, and to allow notification to ICE of those individuals who have been convicted of serious or violent felonies as defined by state law. In the next 60 days, county staff will examine the notification process and what crimes it should apply to, and then bring their findings back to the Board of Supervisors.


Back in 2013 and 2015, there was support to notify ICE regarding these particular convicted serious or violent felons. While there was debate regarding other categories or crimes, this was the criteria that had broad-based support, and it makes sense to move forward with these categories rather than divisively debating dozens of other categories. I think this is common sense and would better protect public safety while abiding by the Constitution and state law.

Bambi Larson's murder stunned and terrified our community, and our nation. Our hearts go out to Ms. Larson's family, friends and neighbors. And like you, I want to see changes that will reduce the chances of this happening again. I have heard from many residents who now live in fear, afraid to be in their homes. My proposal will improve public safety in Santa Clara County and I look forward to its implementation.
